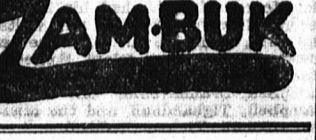

WHERE THE SOLDIERS WILL ENCAMP THIS SUMMER

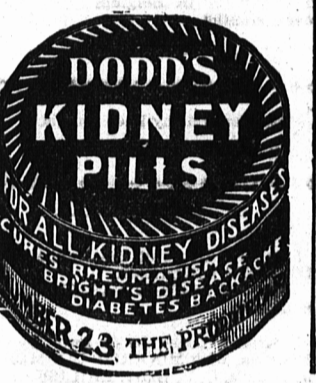
OTTAWA, May 16.—Between 100,000 and 130,000 men, the number varying from time to time, are to be trained in Canada this summer. The policy of the Militia Department is to establish big concentration camps, rather than have the training carried on at numerous divisional centres. Eight regiments from the Maritime Provinces are to train at Aldenhot, N.S. The Quebec Regiment will all be at Valcartier, with some New Brunswick troops under Brig. Gen. Wilson. At the new Camp Borden, at Barrie, where the commandant probably will be Gen. Logie, it is planned to drill about 40,000 Ontario troops
