Downward Revision Of Postal Rates
(Special to the Guardian)
WASHINGTON, April 3.—The House of Representatives today passed without opposition the postal rate revision bill which reduces the rate on postcards to 1 cent and reduces the rate on second-class mail matter to the level of 1921. Two results expected are a loss to postal revenue of \$13,885,000 a year, and a revival of the pettier postcard business.
