THE remains of the late Mrs. W. K. McKay arrived here from Boston yesterday afternoon by the S. O. E. special train from Charlottetown. Mr. McKay accompanied the remains. The funeral takes place this afternoon at 2 o'clock.

THE special train from Summerside, engaged by the Sons of England of this town to take those wishing to attend the opera "Princess Bonnie," in Charlottetown yesterday evening, did not leave here until about 4.40 p. m., instead of 3.15 as was intended, the delay being due to the special not arriving from Charlottetown in time. A special was made from the regular train from the west which took the excursionists, numbering about fifty, to the City.

THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY.

THURSDAY, April 21st.

House met at 12 o'clock.

Hon. Mr. Hughes presented a Petition from the Board of School Trustees of the City of Charlottetown praying that "The Public Schools' Act 1877" and amendments thereto, may be amended according to the provisions of the Bill thereto annexed. A bill was introduced and read a first time.

Hon. Mr. Cummiskey presented a petition from the inhabitants of Fort Augustus praying that an Act may be passed to incorporate the Saint Patrick's Hall Company in accordance with the provisions thereto annexed. A bill in accordance was read a first time.

Mr. McWilliams asked the Commissioner of Public Works if he has received a petition from certain inhabitants of Lot 8 asking for the completion of road leading from the Koughan Road to the isolated farm of Andrew Stewart, Lot 8, a distance of 50 chains right of way free; and what action the Government intends taking in the matter.

The Commissioner said a numerous signed petition had been received and if in the public interest the road would no doubt be opened.

Mr. Currie asked the Commissioner of Public Works whether the amount of \$32.50 paid John McRae as shown on page 48 of the Report of Public Works Department was for labour, and if so, was the labour performed during 1903, and if not, when?

The Commissioner said some years ago a road sale was held and the work sold to John McRae for \$28.50. The work was disputed and had gone to the courts and it was decided that John McRae had done the work. The other \$4 was for road machine work done last year.

Mr. Morson asked the Leader of the Government to repeat the reply in regard to the question of establishing School District, No. 153 King's County for political purposes.

Hon. Mr. Peters said the school was obtained in the ordinary way and was solely for the pupils in attendance. There was no political motive at all.

Mr. Morson rose but the Premier insisted on a point of order and Mr. Morson replied he would give him something to say on the question later.

After some few minutes silence Mr.

Morson moved the adjournment of the debate in order to make some remarks on the question. He proceeded to arrange the Leader of the Government.

Hon. Mr. Cummiskey and Hon. Mr. Peters rose to a point of order contending that Mr. Morson could not move the adjournment of the debate. Hon. Mr. Peters moved that the fifth order of the day be now read.

Mr. Morson, Mr. Mathieson, and Hon. Mr. Peters warmly discussed the point as to whether the former was in order.

Mr. Mathieson said Hon. Mr. Cummiskey should quote authorities in order that the Speaker could decide the question justly, and Mr. McLean condemned the Commissioner of Public Works for laying down his own ruling as law on all occasions.

The Speaker ruled that the member of Cardigan (Mr. Morson) was out of order. Hon. Mr. Peters in moving the House into committee on a Bill respecting certain proceedings in the Court of Chancery and to amend certain acts therein mentioned, explained that the charges had been suggested by the Master of the Rolls and had been approved of by the Leader of the opposition and the Hon member for Cardigan (Mr. Morson).

The House resolved itself into committee of the whole with Mr. Galant in the chair. The Bill was agreed to without amendment.

House adjourned at one o'clock.

House met at 3.30 p. m.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Cummiskey House went into committee with Capt. Read in the chair on the Bill to amend the Act Incorporating the trustees of St. Stewart Presbyterian church. Bill was reported agreed to.

The Bill to amend the City of Charlottetown Incorporation Act and the P. E. I. Dental Act were read a third time and passed.

The debate on the Budget was then resumed and continued until six o'clock.
