A sad shooting accident happened last Wednesday on the marsh about a mile and a half above Amherst. Mack Bigney son of David Bigney, an employee of the Robb Engineering Company and for about four months last spring in the employ of the Guardian went on the marsh with a boy named Oulton to pick blueberries. They took with them a double-barrelled breech-loading gun. In a short time the boys in pursuing a duck got separated and Oulton, hearing the report of the gun, looked in the direction of Bigney and saw him fall. He rushed over and found that in some unaccountable way, the right barrel of the gun, loaded with No. 1 shot, had been discharged and the full charge had struck Bigney on the right side on the head above the ear. A team was procured and the injured boy was taken to Amherst and D. Fitzgerald was called. He was unconscious when the doctor arrived and has remained so. The doctor found a large hole nearly three inches in diameter in the side of the head. The hair was singed and the neck was blackened with powder. The brain was exposed and protruding and a piece of bone three inches by two inches and a half was taken out, beside some smaller pieces. No hope was entertained for his recovery. The unfortunate lad was a brother-in-law of Arthur Chapman of the Hillsboro Bridge works. On hearing of the accident Mrs. Chapman immediately left for Amherst.
