Mrs. L. B. MacMillan was among the bridge hostesses entertaining at a much enjoyed party yesterday afternoon.

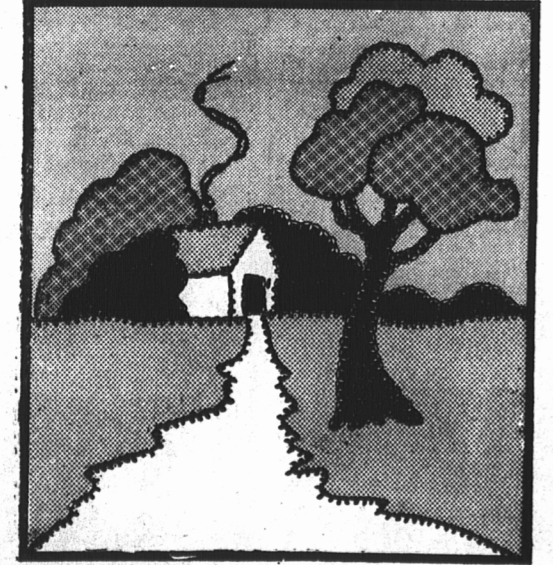
