\*WINTER COMMUNICATION.—A meeting of the citizens of Georgetown was held in the Gordon Hall on Thursday, Feb. 23, quite a large number of the citizens, members of the Town Council and others were present. His Worship Mayor Aitken, presided, and after calling the meeting to order stated that the purpose was to discuss Winter Communication between the island and the mainland and

other matters of interest to the citizens.—Mr. C. A. Conrad was on motion appointed Secretary of the meeting. Several of the leading citizens of the town then addressed the meeting, Messrs J. D. Stewart, J. H. McDonald, F. J. Solomon, S. Knight, P. J. Solomon and others voiced the sentiment that something had to be done to better the present irregular winter service and that the citizens as a body protest against the Steamer Prince Edward Island running to Charlottetown when it was impossible for her to make connections, 17 or more connections had been missed by the boat which caused great inconvenience to the travelling public and much discontent all over the Island with the mail service when it would easily be avoided by running both steamers to Georgetown. It was also proven by the speakers that it was more economical for the Government to run both steamers to Georgetown where they would run on almost summer schedule time instead of taking twenty hours to make the run from Pictou to Charlottetown as the car ferry steamer had done the last trip. Much more was said along the same lines and by citizens who had been travelling to and from the island recently and were well acquainted with the situation. Other matters of interest to the citizens were discussed for some time and it was decided that the meeting should appoint a Committee whose duties were to be practically the same as the Board of trade, to represent the citizens in all matters connected with the welfare of the town. It was moved and seconded that Committee be composed of the following citizens:—Messrs J. D. Stewart, Capt. A. McDonald, W. W. Jenkins, S. Knight, J. H. McDonald. This motion was carried unanimously. It was on motion decided that the Committee have power to add to their number if necessary and that the Secretary be requested to publish the minutes of the meeting in the Guardian and Patriot. The meeting closed by singing God Save the King.

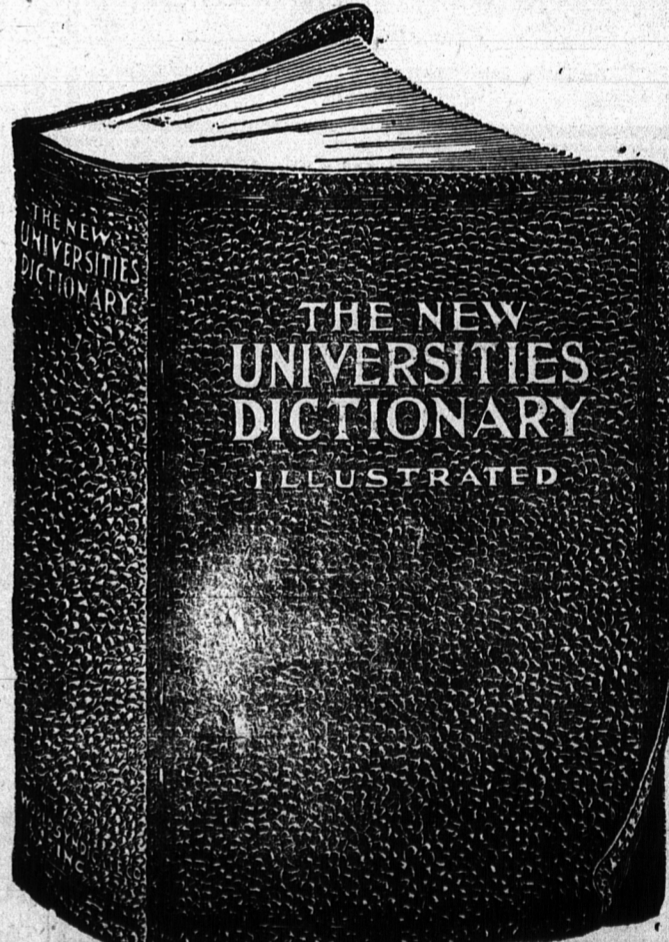
