The latest news, first of all.

James Steele, has returned to Gasperaux from Cardigan.

At latest reports the steamer Minto was four miles off Cape Bear when heavy ice unable to make progress either way and if at all possible will keep on her course to Pictou today.

The steamer Stanley returned to Pictou yesterday for coal, water and provisions and if at all possible will cross today to Georgetown. The rumor that she was to make this port is unfounded. There will also be a mail via the Cape today if possible for iceboats to land. These boats were unable to cross yesterday on account of high winds. There was no special either to Georgetown or Cape Traverse last night.

The guard of honor for the closing of the Legislature will be formed as follows: Capt. W. B. Prowse, J. A. Webster, C. L. McKay, Quarter Master, Sergt. McLeod, four sergeants, four corporals, and sixty three gunners, also thirty three gunners of No. 2 Company. The saluting party will be from No. 2 Co., consisting of one Major or Captain, two Lieutenants, one Sergeant Major, one Quarter Master, six Sergeants, six Corporals, six Privates, eighteen Gunners and one Trumpeter, also one Surgeon, Lieutenant Col. Jenkins. The regimental band will be in attendance and all will parade at the drill shed at eleven o'clock a.m. The staff will consist of Major A. G. Peake, Sergt. Major Ferguson, and Paymaster Sergt. Gill.

Death is sad under any circumstances, but particularly so when it removes from Earth the head of a home and the father of a family, such as was the case when it claimed as its own Henry Acorn of Hermitage. Deceased had been ailing for some time with Bright's Disease, and all that medical skill and kind aid could do was done for his recovery, but the finger of God was there and it proved of no avail. He was possessed of a kind and amiable disposition which endeared him to a large circle of people both far and near, but his greater virtues radiated in his home. He was visited during his illness by his pastor, Rev. Dr. Morrison of Vernon River, who administered to him the last Rites of his Holy Faith, and who also sang the Otsego requies of the dead over his remains on Sunday March 21st, when he was conveyed to his last resting place. Much sympathy is felt in the community for his beloved wife and two small children and aged mother, also for his brothers and sisters, two of whom were summoned home from Boston, Mass., and were at his dying bedside. The pall-bearers were Daniel McEachern, George Lane, Felix Murphy, Joseph Story, Norman Sheldon, and Cohn Larkin.

Last night was probably the worst for many weeks, and consequently one would hardly expect many to be abroad. In spite of this and other entertainments, the opera house was filled to overflowing downstairs, and the balcony had but few vacant seats. The programme, which was divided into four sections, was a long, varied and entertaining one. After the orchestra had given a march, the song cycle took place, and owing to its originality met with hearty applause. As the concluding feature of this number the Island Hymn was sung, the soloist being, Miss Hildred Gates, and eventually the composer, and Author were called to the front, receiving an enthusiastic ovation. The second part, consisted of a waltz by the orchestra entitled "Sweet Memories," and a Flower Frolic by the infant class, which was especially enjoyed by the parents and others. The song "I love a lassie" by F. Bremner in costume, met with general approval, and the popular singer was given a hearty encore. Miss Hazel Milligan's reading proved interesting, and the Scotch Dance by Four Fays in charge of Miss Gillis simply brought down the house. An intermission was dispersed, with orchestral selections and the sale of delicious home made candy. As a concluding number a game of living chess was played between J. D. Seaman and L. C. Worthy, and followed with great interest by the audience. Miss K. Stanley, and Miss Gillis as pianists were beyond criticism, and deserve great credit for their efforts in the musical line. Professor Watts and his orchestra, need hardly be mentioned, as their ability is too well known, though if anything they were even better than usual. Genuine success was the keynote of the whole affair, and it is a pleasure to note that the efforts of these amateurs to give the residents of Charlottetown something of a first class nature were not in vain.

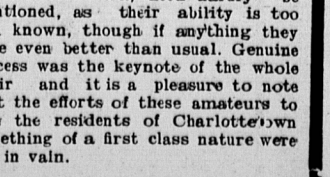

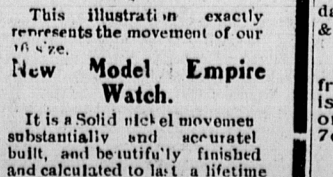
