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### REV. JAMES ROSS WAS ELECTED MODERATOR

Two Hundred Delegates Present at the Opening Session of the Maritime Presbyterian Synod at Fredericton.

FREDERICTON, N. B., Oct. 7.—The forty-sixth Synod of the Presbyterian Church in the Maritime Provinces met in Fredericton tonight. The attendance, which promises to be unusually large, was affected tonight by a break-down of the special from Truro with over two hundred commissioners on board.

The retiring Moderator, Rev. Angus McMillan, preached the Synod sermon from Rev. 2:10, "Be thou faithful unto death and I will give thee the crown of life." The topic of the discourse was "Christian Faithfulness and its Reward."

After the Synod was constituted the Moderator addressed the court in brief and appropriate terms, and concluded by calling for the election of a successor.

Judge Forbes moved the nomination of Rev. James Ross, Superintendent of Missions in the Synod. Dr. Stewart seconded the nomination. The motion was unopposed, and Mr. Ross was acclaimed as he was led to the platform.

The new Moderator then addressed the court in fitting terms. He referred to the "Magnificent Challenge" that is in the docket, a challenge which he hoped the Synod would courageously take up. The hearty thanks of the Synod was extended to the retiring Moderator, and also to Judge Forbes for his services in securing a special train.

Rev. Frank Baird, the Clerk of the Presbytery of St. John, was appointed assistant Clerk. Dr. Stewart announced his decision to resign the clerkship of the Synod. It was with great enthusiasm agreed that a committee be appointed to take Dr. Stewart's resignation into consideration in the hope that it may not take effect, and that Dr. Stewart may not leave the bounds of the Synod. The first sermon was closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

**METHODIST FORWARD MOVEMENT.**—A very large meeting of the official Quarterly Board of the Methodist Church of this city was held Tuesday evening in the interests of the Forward Movement. The Rev. G. W. F. Glendinning, the Pastor occupied the chair, and the first half hour was spent in devotional services. The Chairman then outlined the plan of campaign and emphasized the absolute necessity of combined effort. This church's share in the great movement includes 150 added to its membership, 150 new Sunday School scholars, 50 added to its Young Peoples' Societies, 200 Intercessors, 200 Personal Workers, 100 Christian Stewards, and 50 Volunteers for Life Service. Committees were formed for the several Departments and the whole programme was arranged for the carrying out of the work. A congregational Social to which every Methodist in Charlotte will be invited will be held on Thursday evening the 23rd instant in connection with the movement.

**BALLEM-WOOD WEDDING.**—At the home of Mr. and Mrs. George M. Ballem, Southport, on Wednesday evening, Oct. 1st a pretty wedding took place when their daughter, Miss Mildred May was united in marriage to Mr. George Lawson Wood, of Hazelbrook. They both thoroughly enjoyed their short sojourn in Charlottetown.

**MAJOR CYRUS McMILLAN QUOTED IN PARLIAMENT.**—During the debate in the House of Commons on the alleged manipulation of soldiers' votes, Mr. Jacques Bureau quoted a speech stated to have been delivered "publicly in Prince Edward Island" by Major Cyrus McMillan in support of the allegations. He added that Major Cyrus McMillan intended to write his experiences having to do with elections overseas and to publish them in pamphlet form for the edification of the public of Canada and show how much and how hearty was the support of the Union Government in the last election.

**THANKSGIVING SHOOT.**—In connection with the rifle shooting on Thanksgiving Day the Charlottetown Rifle Trophy will be shot for. Several teams have scored a win and two have scored two wins on it; three teams permanent possession. The matches will be at the popular ranges, 200, 500, and 600 yards two sighting shots and seven shots on score at each range. Team shoots will be arranged between teams of three from the various rifle clubs. Pointed ammunition will be used and will be available on the grounds. Arrangements are being made to accommodate forty marksmen and there will be a generous prize list.

**FREIGHT ACTIVITY.**—Freight on the P. E. I. R. in and out of the Charlottetown station is exceptionally heavy and no vacant space is to be noticed on any of the tracks in the yard. In fact the storage track on the outskirts of the city has to be utilized quite often in order to accommodate cars. The shipments of potatoes to the mainland has not yet begun to any extent except from the west, where considerable shipping is now going on. The movement of cattle and livestock from Charlottetown is active. The week following exhibition close upon one hundred horses left the city.

**ADDRESS AND PRESENTATION.**—The employees of the Victoria Hotel waited upon Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Sterns on Saturday last and presented them with souvenir gifts and a kindly worded address expressing their sorrow at parting, their appreciation of the kindness invariably shown them by Mr. and Mrs. Sterns and children, and wishing them all good in the future. Mr. Sterns, to whom the presentation was a complete surprise thanked the donors fittingly and expressed the hope that their relations with the new management of the Victoria Hotel would be as mutually pleasant as they had been during the years of his proprietorship.

**CANADIAN MANUFACTURERS COMING.**—Seven members of the Executive of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association are expected to arrive in Charlottetown this evening. A special meeting of the Board of Trade will be held this evening at 8:30 in the Board of Trade rooms to meet these gentlemen and to discuss with them any questions that may arise, particularly with reference to transportation. On Friday it is proposed to give the visitors a drive around the city and to points of interest in the vicinity and probably a motor trip in the harbor. In the evening the visitors will be entertained at a luncheon at the Victoria Hotel at which prominent citizens will be present and a programme of addresses and music will be provided.

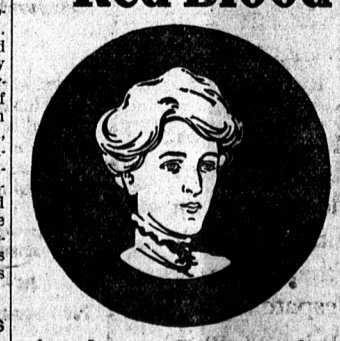


