The opportunity given to East in today's deal will not occur often enough to be declined.

South dealer. Both sides vulnerable.

North's acceptance of the three notrump contract was a very questionable action--with no outside entry, it was too doubtful that the long diamond suit could be run. Actually, six diamonds could have been made and though that would have been a rather optimistic contract, a five-diamond contract was certainly preferable to three notrump, which should have been defeated. West led the spade queen. Declarer, fearing a possible shift to hearts took the trick and, for some strange reason led the diamond ten. This was lucky, because if he had first cashed the ace, East naturally would have held up his king until declarer's diamonds were exhausted. When, however, the ten was played and West discarded a club, declarer overtook with the diamond jack, and East apparently was panicked by the thought that if he failed to take his diamond king, declarer would be able to pick up that card on a finesse. So, with the evident thought that it would be frightened to have his diamond king another, East went in with that card--and from that point on the defenders might as well have left the table! South could control any return, and the high cards in his own hand and the six diamonds available in dummy, five-odd became easy. East made a very bad trade when he "protected" his diamond king! He should have sacrificed that card cheerfully rather than permit the establishment of dummy's long suit. Yes, South could have smothered the king if East held it up--but that still would have left him a trick short of contract.
