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EXCHEQUER COURT'S DECISION ON G.T.R.

Justice Cassels Holds That Valuation of Stock is Matter for Parliament not for Board.

(Special to The Guardian) OTTAWA, Sept. 7.—That the finding of the third member of the board, preferred and common stocks which are to be acquired by the government, have a substantial value. As a result, the board is held liable to be taken. The matter is one for parliament to decide, is the finding of Mr. Justice Cassels and Sir Thomas White in the award of the arbitration commission appointed to value the stocks in question.

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105 HORSES ENTERED FOR CHARLOTTETOWN EXHIBITION RACES

Largest Number of Entries Ever Received by Any Track in the Maritime Provinces. Large Stables of Past Horses Coming from Maine, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia Besides the Island's Fastest Horses. These Horses Will Bring With Them a Record Number of Visitors.

That the big prize lists and attractions for winning drivers appeals to the horsemen of the Maritime Provinces and Maine was amply demonstrated by the exceptionally large list of entries received by the Secretary of the Charlottetown Driving Club for the Exhibition races Sept 27th to Oct. 1st.

The separate horses total one hundred and five or nineteen more than last year which surpassed all previous records. No race meet in the Maritime Provinces ever had such an array of speedy entries and the five days racing of this year will surpass in brilliancy anything heretofore staged in any city in eastern Canada, and will be difficult to exceed anywhere.

Not only is there a tremendous entry list but the horses entered are of the highest class—Famous names in the racing world. Every class was well filled, the only light entry being in the 2.40 class (restricted to Maritime bred horses). There is no doubt that such horses coming here will bring a record crowd with them and citizens must be prepared for such a contingency.

With it, Prime Minister Lloyd George sent a courier to Moy Hill, near here, where the King is staying to acquaint His Majesty with the cabinet's decision, which will be made public Thursday night.

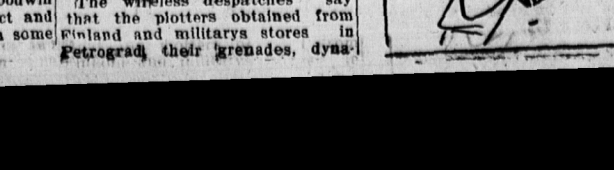
