THE S. S. City of London will leave Charlottetown for Halifax and Brash Wharves for the balance of this season on Wednesday at 1.00 p.m. and Tuesday at the regular hour 2.00 o'clock.

The Intercolonial Ry. has also placed an order for five sleeping and baggage cars, and 75 box cars, 60,000 lbs. capacity, with the Cross Car Manufacturing Co., Cobourg, Ont.

PRINCE LOUIS of Battenburg will spend tomorrow, Sunday, as he wishes, and in the evening will dine with Mayor McLellan. On the following day he will be the guest of the New York Chamber of Commerce at a luncheon, and in the evening will attend the dinner at Coney Island, which the American blue jackets are to give to their "British cousins." The Prince will give a grand ball on board the flagship Drake on Nov. 14. On Nov. 15, the last evening of his visit, he will be given a dinner by the Pilgrim's Society of New York. The next day his squadron will sail for Gibraltar.

THE death took place at Annandale, Lot 55, King's County, on the morning of the 8th inst., of the wife of Sam Robertson, elder, in the 52nd year of her age. She was a daughter of the late John Dingwell, Annandale, and was a lady of an amiable disposition, kindly affectionate towards all, full of sympathy for the poor and afflicted, a dutiful and loving wife and mother, and a consistent member of the Presbyterian church. She died as she lived trusting in the finished work of the blessed Redeemer. Her demise is greatly regretted, not only by her own family, but by a large number of friends and acquaintances who showed their regard for the departed and their sympathy with the bereaved by following the remains to their last resting place in the cemetery at the Presbyterian church, Annandale, on the 8th inst. The services both in the house and in the church, were conducted by the pastor, Rev. M. N. McLeod.

AFTER a lingering illness of three years duration, borne with Christian patience and resignation to the will of Almighty God, Bella MacLean, eldest daughter of William MacLean Esq., of Bradshaw, breathed out her spirit to Him who gave it on Saturday the 4th inst. Last week one farmer from a river point brought to the city a dozen or so turkeys of good size and quality.
