**Commence Battle  
 Over Prohibition**  
 WASHINGTON, March 11.—The  
 validity of constitutional prohibi-  
 tion will be fought out in a legal  
 battle of attorneys for the Federal  
 Government, the dry states, and  
 the wet states and the liquor interests  
 in the United States Supreme  
 Court. A decision is not expected be-  
 fore April or later.  
 One of the greatest attacks ever  
 made against any statute or part of  
 the Constitution has been directed  
 against the dry laws by the wet  
 forces. It has drawn a vigorous de-  
 fence of prohibition from the Fed-  
 eral Government and dry organiza-  
 tions.  
 The issue centres on whether  
 prohibition is a valid subject for  
 an amendment to the Constitution  
 and whether the Volstead law en-  
 forcing the amendment is con-  
 stitutional. Probably 25 angles of  
 attack have been launched against  
 the two.

**Sunday Sliding  
 Off in Ottawa**  
 OTTAWA, March 10.—Following  
 an investigation by Toronto officials  
 of the Lord's day Alliance, and  
 Chief of Police Hamilton, of Car-  
 lleton County Police the Sunday to-  
 bogging at Rockcliffe has been  
 ordered stopped because the run-  
 ning of the slide is a breach of the  
 Lord's Day Act. The slide was  
 closed and will not be open again  
 on Sunday this season.  
 Ottawa has been under the vigil-  
 ant eyes of Toronto officials of the  
 Alliance for a number of months,  
 several investigations having al-  
 ready been carried out regarding  
 the various Sunday amusements in  
 the Capital.

**Cotton Frenzy is  
 Food Crisis Cause**  
 LONDON, March 11.—The food  
 crisis in Egypt is due mainly to  
 land owners, including the land  
 owning peasantry, increasing in the  
 area planted in cotton so as to take  
 advantage of the soaring prices of  
 cotton, according to the Daily  
 Mail's Cairo correspondent.  
 Wheat and other cereals actu-  
 ally have been plowed up when  
 approaching maturity in order to  
 sow cotton, the correspondent con-  
 tinues, "and the cotton area is now  
 nearly 25 per cent greater than be-  
 fore the war. Normally Egypt prac-  
 tically feeds herself, but in view  
 of the present shortage of cereals  
 there is greater danger of the  
 famished people being driven into  
 rioting. The situation is bad in the  
 towns, but it is worse in the coun-  
 try. It is at its worst in upper  
 Egypt where the difficulties of im-  
 portation are greater.

**Too Much Gold Held in  
 Scates Boosts H.C. of L.**  
 LONDON, March 11.—I find  
 most extraordinary and diverse  
 views on the question of the rise  
 in the cost of food and everything  
 else we require. I can assure you  
 that the main cause of the rise in  
 the cost of living is not profiteer-  
 ing—it is a contributory cause in  
 some direction, but in far fewer  
 than you would think.  
 "In America the cost of living is  
 up almost as much as it is in Great  
 Britain, and America has less paper  
 money than Great Britain. The  
 cost of living is up in the United  
 States because America has got  
 a very large proportion of the gold  
 of the world.  
 "The United States used to have  
 about \$200,000,000 in gold, but it  
 now has about \$2,500,000,000 in  
 gold. There is so much gold in  
 America that there is no use for it  
 and the value of gold there has  
 fallen to about half of its value,  
 expressed in commodities. There  
 are about 100 million pounds of  
 gold there, and the value of English  
 pound notes is about half the value  
 of a bit of gold which it was sup-  
 posed to be as good as before the  
 war.  
 "There is a concentration of gold  
 in the United States far in excess  
 of what we can use satisfactorily,  
 and that is a matter that com-  
 pletely nullifies the possibility of  
 immediate alteration.

**Doubts Efficacy of League**  
 PARIS, March 11.—"Personally  
 I doubt that the League of Nations  
 will succeed in ensuring the peace  
 of the world and the security of  
 France. In any event will be a  
 long time before it is to do these  
 things." Marshal Foch hero of the  
 world war, declared in an inter-  
 view here today.  
 "Until the League of Nations actu-  
 ally is created it is impossible  
 to fix its real value." Each said.  
 "But as a soldier, I believe the  
 safety of France can be guaranteed  
 only by tangible securities, such  
 as the Rhine barrier."  
 "Germany was not crushed nor  
 dismembered by the war. She re-  
 maining a menace to France."  
 Under these conditions, the old  
 soldier declared "I feel that France  
 cannot depend upon the fine dream  
 which has been elected by those  
 who promote it. While it is not  
 personally reject the League I feel  
 that France cannot afford to ac-  
 cept it as an established organiza-  
 tion able to preserve peace until it  
 has proved its efficacy."

**Germany, though I hate the idea,  
 unless the British do it there is no  
 chance of their getting back to  
 anything like normal in the way  
 of supplies of food, clothing and  
 household things."**

**"Great Britain cannot get its  
 share of the gold back until it  
 sends America goods for which  
 America will have to pay in gold.  
 "I have been asked, why does not  
 the British Government reduce the  
 cost of living in Britain. My answer  
 is that no human being and no  
 force of law, can reduce the cost  
 of living in Europe until we get  
 gold flowing back from America  
 to Great Britain and the contin-  
 ent.  
 "The big problem which the Brit-  
 ish Government has been tackling  
 from day to day has been to get  
 such a movement of manufactured  
 goods from Great Britain in its ex-  
 port trade to America as will at-  
 tract gold back to England. The  
 only way the people of Great Brit-  
 ain can bring down their cost of  
 living is to reduce their demands,  
 especially for expensive sorts of  
 goods, and let them go overseas,  
 and accumulate credit in America.  
 "I believe that within a few  
 weeks the value of the British ex-  
 port trade will be in excess of its  
 import value.
