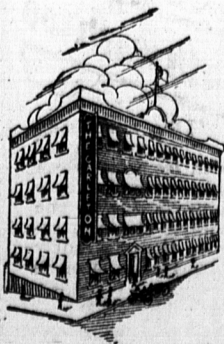

Islander Dies In Regina

Roderick McLeod, for some years a resident of Regina, 64 years of age, died at his residence 1910 Retailack street, early today after an illness of one month from diabetes.

He was born in Hartsville, Prince Edward Island, and came to the Canadian West in the early 80's as one of the original employees on the construction of the western section of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

Mr. McLeod is survived by his widow, formerly Miss Mary Rose, Charlottetown, P. E. I. and one sister, Mrs. Bessie Gott, of Hancock, Maine, and one brother, John McLeod of Vancouver. There were no children by the union.

The funeral will be held Thursday afternoon from the home at 4 o'clock and will be under the auspices of the Orange Order. Bro. H. D. Letch and Rev. A. D. MacKenzie will conduct the services.—Regina Leader.

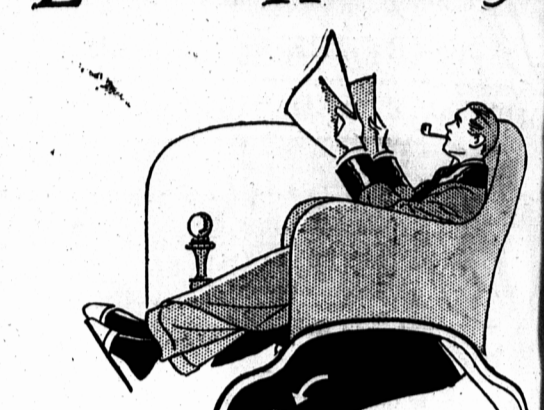
