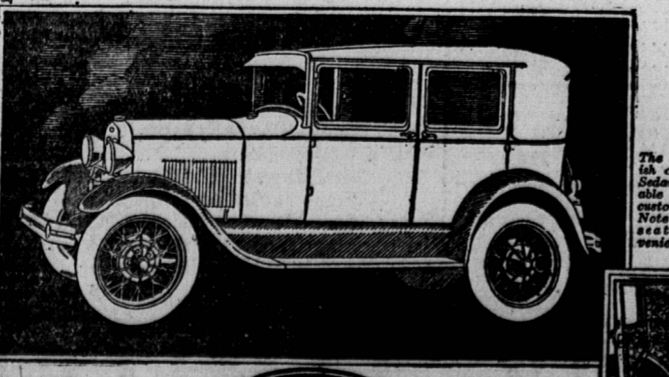

Mrs. L. Court is still at her old home at Pleasant Grove, being called by the recent sickness and death of her mother Mrs. J. M. Crockett.

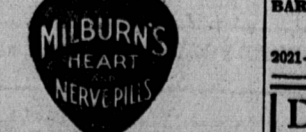
Mr. Theo. McDonald has returned to his home at Covehead after an operation in P. E. I. Hospital.
