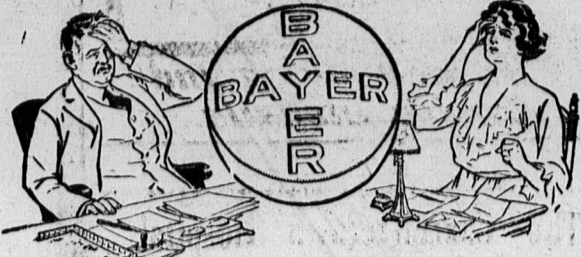

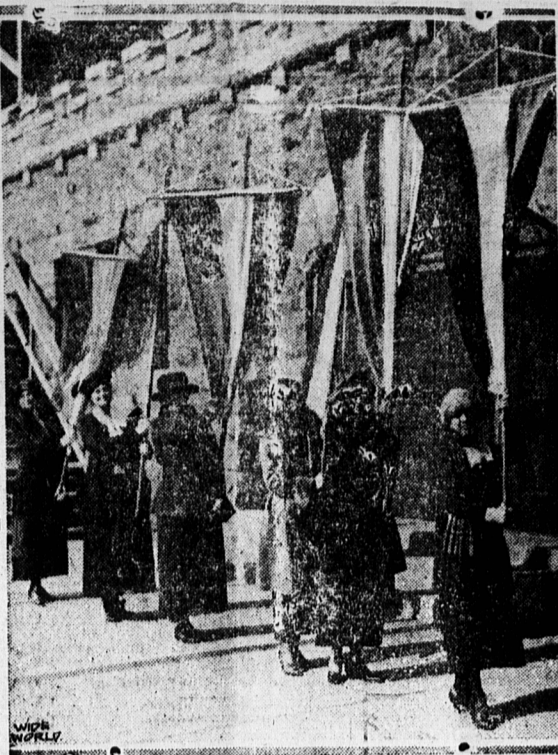

IN MEMORIAM

JOHN FOLEY

The death took place at Little Harbour on June 9th of John Foley, aged 77 years, after an illness of some months.

The late Mr. Foley, who was one of the oldest and most respected citizens in his community, was born in Newfoundland and in his early years, in the years when the sailing ship was the carrier of our Commerce, followed the sea.

Coming to Little Harbour fifty years ago Mr. Foley has been one of Little Harbour's most prominent residents, taking an active interest in the welfare of the community. For many years and at his death he was chairman of the school trustees.

He was highly regarded by all for his neighborly qualities and his advice was frequently sought for and accepted.

Mr. Foley was twice married, first to Emily McDonald, his second wife being Mary McLean, of Little Harbour. The first family comprised seven children, four of whom, John Aeneas, Daniel, Joseph and Elizabeth, all of Boston, and James of Little Harbour, survive.

The second family comprised eleven children, six of whom, Christina and Augustus, of Boston Mrs. Andrew Mooney, Mary Ann, Dan, Adolphus, of Little Harbour, and Michael Joseph, of Nova Scotia, survive.

THE 1920 JUVENILES

All of the leading stables have a splendid lot of two year old trotters in training. Their work has also been very satisfactory according to the reports from the different training camps. We expect there will be another Peter Volo or Lacy Wanetka among the foals of 1920 to be seen. The average rate of speed will, however, be lower in 1920 than it was in 1919 when Mr. Dudley and Sister B. B. were the only ones to beat 2:10 while Dudette, Natalie the Great and Daystar stopped at that figure.

In the matter of fast work, Harvest Barbara, Hollywood Fancy and Pavilion have attracted the most attention. Each of them have trotted miles below 2:20. They were trained on the southern tracks during the winter months and that the Harvest filly is well along in her work is evidenced by the fact that Hyde placed her name in the 2:30 list at Pinehurst in April. Last week she worked a mile in 2:14 at Cleveland. She should be up to a mile in 2:10 when she starts in her first mile heat engagement at Toronto the second week in July.

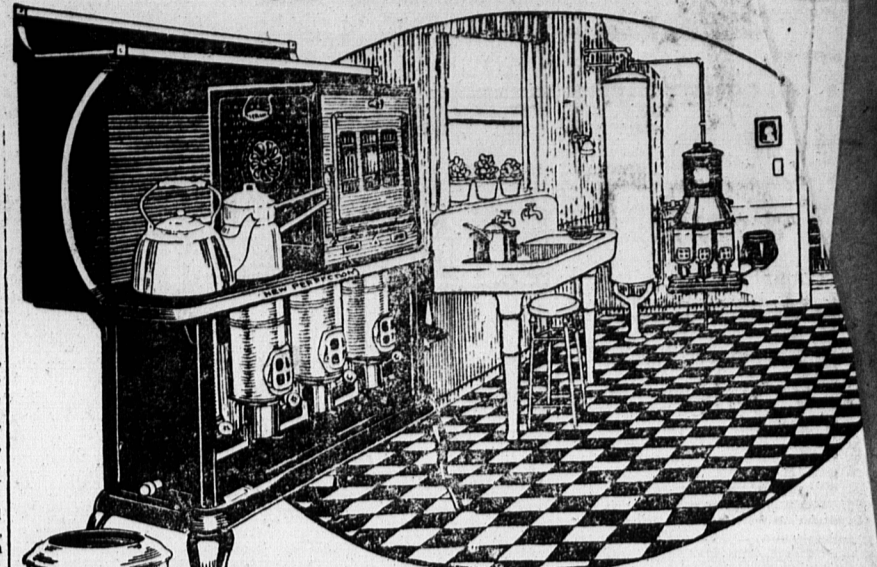
Hollywood Fancy is one of the products of J. L. Dodge's farm. She is by Guy Axworthy out of the dam of Hollywood Bob, 2:04 1/2, the fastest three year old in 1918. She worked a mile in 2:26 as a yearling and early in June trotted the Lexington track in 2:17. Fanny is a graduate of the Memphis training camp. He is by J. Malcolm Forbes out of the good race mare Allie Watts, 2:07 1/2, with which Fred Edman won over a dozen races in 1916. He has been a mile in 2:17, the last half of it being trotted in 1:05 and the last quarter in 31 1/2 seconds.

These three youngsters will meet the pick of the Murphy, Cox and McDonald stables at Toledo. Lon has a clever pair in the Native King filly Eloise Ray and Lillian Hilly by U. Forbes, while Cox has a barn full. During the Indianapolis record meeting he marked Marge the Great 2:23 1/2, Evelyn the Great 2:24 1/2, Miss Winston, 2:28 1/4, The Great Rose 2:24 1/2, The Great Volo, 2:27 1/4; brother of Peter Volo and Volga, and Lee Tide, 2:24, the last named being by Lee Axworthy out of the dam of Daystar and Brushloff. Any one of them is fast enough to go to the races but a champion is Frank Troit, Cox likes Evelyn the Great the best of all. On race day, however, he will be sweet on the one that can show the most speed and racing manners.

Before leaving Poughkeepsie, Murphy had eight two year olds that could trot in 2:20, the stable's choice being Jane Volo by Peter Volo out of Miss Jane Jones, 2:14 1/2, by Barongate. Rose Scott is also another favorite. She is by that splendid race horse Peter Scott, 2:05, who topped the list of money winners in 1915, out of Roya McKinney, 2:07 1/2. The other prospects include Guy Purchase by Guy Axworthy out of Sister Florentine, 2:09 1/2, Eunice Bell by Peter Volo out of Margaret Parrish, 2:06 1/2, and a colt by Silkko which acts like a better prospect than Periscope did in 1918.

The above, however, are only a few of the youngsters which have shown sufficient speed to warrant making engagements for them along the line. Among the latter is the Lee Axworthy pair Kernel and Miss Willoughby in Ben White's stable and the J. Malcolm Forbes filly Betsy Chandler which was purchased by Brook Farm at the Old Glory Sale. The

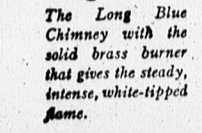
