

The Montreal Witness in referring to the preservation of forests is says:—In Canada we will have to take up the question of forest preservation in earnest some of these days, and when we do we can learn much from what has been done, and is being done, in the United States in this direction. Several states and the federal government have adopted systematic plans, and the reports of progress published from time to time show how quickly and generously nature responds to the efforts of man in re-clothing with forest trees areas turned into barren wastes by former cupidity and recklessness. Private companies, too, whose business depends on an adequate supply of timber have gone into the work of forestry on practical business principles in a manner which has already given assurance of abundant success. Among these is the Houston Oil Company, of Texas, which owns a million acres of forest lands. In the contract it has recently entered into with a lumber company conditions are made which could be adopted with evident advantage by our local government, and the preservation of the forests thereby secured. Those conditions are intended to prevent the wasteful methods in vogue among lumbermen. The land is not to be laid waste by indiscriminate chopping nor is young timber to be burned. The smaller trees are to be kept standing uninjured, and saplings are to be carefully protected. Provision is made for continuous growth, so that the woodland shall be kept intact and maturity assured for trees, now in their growth or middle life. If this plan, which is enforced with great strictness in the forests of Europe, had been insisted on by the government of Canada in early days, the vast pine forests which have wholly disappeared in the regions traversed by our northern streams, and which are entirely unfit for agriculture, would still be producing large quantities of marketable timber, with the prospect of continuance for ages to come. But it is not yet too late, Canada still possess the largest and finest forests on the continent, perhaps in the world, and their proper administration is a matter of national importance. No longer should the destruction of whole forests be permitted by persons only intent on obtaining the best timber they contain. Rainfall, the preservation of and springs streams, climatic conditions, as well as the public interest, should be considered in dealing with our forests. [P. E. Island people who have been advocating the preservation of the forests of this province will be thoroughly in accord with the above.]
