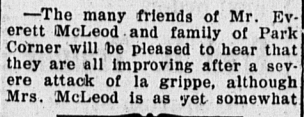

Several Turkish Officials Deported

(Dom. Press Special.) CONSTANTINOPLE, March 22.—Halide Edib, the most prominent woman leader among the Turkish Nationalists and Reouf Bey, Deputy for Sivas, and mouthpiece of Mustafa Kemal, in this city; Kara Vassif Bey and several other members of the Chamber of Deputies have been deported, presumably to Madia by the British. They were placed on board the cruiser Hebiusa yesterday shortly before that warship sailed.

After Mustafa Kemal and Reouf Bey, Halide was the best known speaker and organizer in the Nationalist movement. When the Greeks landed at Smyrna and some Turks were killed she cast aside all traditions of Turkish women. She organized and addressed mass meetings and so inflamed the Turks when alleged plans for the dismemberment of the country that she called higher commissioners to her side further meetings. She has often been described in the British press as a "fire brand and a dangerous agitator."

Peace Treaty Returned Strong Anti-Jewish Feeling in Germany

WASHINGTON, March 22.—The Treaty of Versailles was returned to President Wilson today by the Senate after it had failed of ratification last night for a fourth time. There was no intimation as to what President Wilson would do with the treaty. While House officials said the usual procedure would be to send it to the State Department for "burial" in the archives there. The document which was delivered to the Senate by the President in person last July 10, was taken to the White House by George A. Sanderson, secretary of the Senate. He was accompanied by two Senate clerks, presumably Mr. Forester did not accept the treaty however, the visitors being referred to Secretary Tumulty.

Mr. Tumulty was with the President at the time, and when he returned to the executive offices, he received the treaty, he said there would be no statement from the President.

The Senate was not in session today but when the House met, representatives of the League of Nations, offered a joint resolution declaring a state of peace between the United States and Germany. Under the resolution Germany would recognize all rights which the United States enjoy under the Versailles Treaty. Should Germany fail to agree to this, the President would be authorized to prohibit resumption of trade relations, or the extension of loans or credits.

LONDON, March 22.—The London Times, in a long editorial, has expressed its opinion on the rejection of the peace treaty by the United States Senate, saying that the "front of President Wilson for the time being completed and expressed fear that the prospect of the treaty of the League of Nations being the leading issue in the coming campaign must be accepted."

"It is a regrettable prospect for all the world, and particularly for ourselves," says the Times. "None the less, we adhere to the belief, which we share with Lord Grey, that the American people are unlikely in the long run to withdraw their influence in world affairs or to be satisfied with playing only a small part in the League of Nations."

Referring to the warning of its Washington correspondent that England in the campaign will be denounced as the oppressor of Ireland, Persia, India and Egypt, and the supporters together with France of the "new imperialism," the Times says:

"We have gone through the same sort of storms before, though this one promises to be exceptionally violent, and they have not hurt us very much." It expresses the hope that "in view of the inflammatory state of the American feelings during a campaign of months, British statesmen will refrain from repeating the extraordinary mischievous blunder which the Prime Minister committed in his latest reference to the treaty and the League."

Sims Names the "Pull the Wool" Authority

WASHINGTON, March 22.—It was Admiral W. S. Benson who warned Admiral Sims "don't let the British pull the wool over your eyes." Sims declared at the Senate Naval inquiry today.

Judge Said He Would Have Shot Straight

MONTREAL, March 20.—In the King's Bench today the jury without retiring returned a verdict of not guilty in the case of Mrs. Joseph Clements of Ste. Anne de Bellevue, charged with the attempted murder of P. Ritcher, last December. Mrs. Clements to protect her husband, who was threatened by Ritcher, a powerfully built man, fired first at the floor and then put a bullet in his thigh. In evidence she stated that Ritcher's wife when at the hearing following the shooting had said to her: "Why didn't you kill him?" In his address to the jury Mr. Justice Desj said that had he been in the place of Mrs. Clements he would have shot straight and not at the feet of the man who tried to break up her home. The jury immediately after hearing Judge's charge returned a verdict as stated.

City of Berlin Badly Scared

LONDON, March 22.—Despatches here indicated the situation in Germany is becoming quieter. The Government has re-established its authority at Kiel and Leipzig. The Atty Gen. has started proceedings against Dr. Kapp and General Luttwitz, leaders of the insurrection. Rumors that a Communist army was marching on Berlin caused great excitement in the German capital yesterday. The inner city was fenced with double barbed wire entanglements. Entanglements also were erected from Moabit to Schoenberg, suburbs of Berlin. Machine guns have been placed at regular intervals throughout Berlin; holes have been knocked in government buildings for erection of machine gun emplacements.

Fearful Tragedy At Oxford, N. S.

AMHERST, March 22.—A coroner's inquest was commenced on Saturday afternoon at Oxford and sensational evidence was given in connection with the death of Lewis King in the fire in the Wood Paton block on Saturday morning. Crown Prosecutor Hanway is following closely the future developments which depend on the outcome of the finish of the inquest on Monday.

Evidence given points to the fact that the fire originated in M. A. Peel's store which destroyed the block. Also that Peel and King were the last persons in the store a few minutes before the fire.

There was evidence that the two were drinking and when Peel got home about one o'clock he told his wife there was a fire down town. He gave his wife the key to the shop to get his papers and money. Nothing was said about King who was found lying face downwards about 100 feet from the rear of the store.

King's arms and legs were badly burned but his body and face not burned beyond recognition.

Mr. and Mrs. Rushton who occupied rooms near the store in the same block gave the evidence which gave a serious turn as to the origin of the fire. Mrs. Rushton was awakened by the noise of scuffling and quarrelling in Peel's store when she put her ear to the floor and heard one say "You've got a D—fool you are going to burn me alive!"

Al is Peel's first name. This was about five or ten minutes before the fire. The firemen testified they knew the name of the man who jumped from the Ocean Limited east-bound in the vicinity of Nigadoo, Saturday afternoon, or fell from the train, the exact particulars of which will probably never be known, and was so badly injured that he died at Bathurst where he was taken by the train crew, a short time later.
