

Queen's County Dominion Election

To the Electors of Queens' County,
Ladies and Gentlemen:

Six years ago Mr. A. A. McLean and myself were elected to represent you in the House of Commons. As the result of the election then held the Liberal-Conservative party came into power. During the years that have passed since then I have endeavored to the best of my ability to procure as large a portion as possible of governmental advantages for my native Province. The Government of the party I was elected to support, has done much for the betterment of our trade and commerce and our agricultural interests. It gave us the Car Ferry, increased grants to agriculture, the addition of \$100,000 annually to our provincial subsidy, secured for our Province four members for all time to come, built a number of wharves for the convenience of our farmers and shippers, also dredged the docks at Charlottetown and elsewhere.

When it is considered that for over three years of his period, the Dominion revenues have been urgently required for war purposes, I feel assured that our efforts are not unappreciated by the people of the Province, irrespective of party. I am convinced that what has been done will prove a lasting benefit to the Province and will afford a great impetus to our future prosperity.

During the last session of Parliament I was pleased to support Sir Robert Borden in his endeavors to unite the two great political parties which divide Canada in one Government. Such a consummation would insure a more vigorous prosecution of the war, and would be the means of raising with the least possible friction the necessary recruits to go to the assistance of our hard pressed brave boys at the front.

I am highly gratified that a Union Government has now been formed. It is composed of the strongest men of both parties and shall have my full support.

At the last session of Parliament an Act was passed establishing machinery for the holding of a Dominion election. It provided for the appointment of enumerators to make up lists of voters for all the polls. These will shortly be appointed. May I be permitted to request at every possible assistance be given the enumerators in the preparation of these lists, so that everyone in the County, entitled to a vote, shall have his or her name on the lists before polling day.

In thus giving an account of my Stewardship, permit me to state I shall be candidate for this Country at the coming election.

The crisis which involves our Country is the most important in its history. It devolves upon everyone to consider well the issue raised: are the people of Canada to leave unsupported our brave boys at the Front, who have so long and so well fought for the preservation of our rights and liberties, and whose splendid deeds of heroism have covered Canada with glory and renown? It is impossible.

I respectfully ask for the votes of all true and loyal men and women of this large and intelligent County of Queens', assuring them that the best interests of our province and especially our soldiers shall have at all times my sincere support.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations
THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or the Agency for the District. Application may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but no fee is charged. Price \$100 per acre. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.
In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years from the date of pre-emption. Price \$100 per acre. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

NEHEMIAH REBUILDS THE WALLS OF JERUSALEM.

(Nehemiah 4:7-21.)
"The Lord is my helper; I will not fear; what shall man do unto me."—Heb. 13:6.—Golden Text.

Two weeks ago we learned how the prayers of Nehemiah were answered and the story took us to the safe arrival of Nehemiah in Jerusalem. For three days after his arrival Nehemiah rested. Then at night he secretly went out to make a personal inspection of the walls. He found all that had been told him in Babylon was true; the walls were in a very bad state. Calling together the leading men of the city, he proposed that the walls be rebuilt. Enemies of the Jews laughed scornfully at his proposal, but the Jews showed they were ready to help by their response, "Let us rise up and build."

Nehemiah tactfully organized the workmen into about forty groups, one of which was to be put to work in each breach of the city wall, every one over against his own house. He personally directed the work, and it was carried on with zeal by the men. In chap. 2 we first read about Sanballat and Tobiah. They were Samaritans. They despised the Jews and did not wish them to prosper, for they feared that they might become a power in the land. They jeered at the workmen and ridiculed their work and their leader. But the work went on, for the Jews were in earnest. Finding that their ridicule had no effect and that the work was being pushed forward, these enemies, jealous of its progress, planned a surprise attack, but Nehemiah was on the watch and the plot failed. Then Jews from other places, the Philistines, Arabians, Ammonites and Samaritans, a ring of enemies we shall find if we look at the map, conspired to march against the city and put an end to the rebuilding of the walls. The Jews who, since the coming of Nehemiah, had begun to hope, lost their courage. Burdens looked heavy and they felt they could not win against their enemies. But Nehemiah showed them how. He appealed to their courage, their faith in God and their love of home, and soon their panic passed and they returned to their work heartened by their steadfast leader. When the plotters learned that Nehemiah knew of their plans and was on guard, they postponed their attack, and kept postponing it until it was too late. Nehemiah did not slacken his vigilance for a minute. He gave them no chance to attack. He arranged that the men who worked at the rebuilding should be prepared to fight at any moment. Each stone-mason became a man of the sword as well as of the trowel. He used the trowel, and was ready at any instant to use the sword. He worked, and, if the need arose, he would fight.

As a last resort the enemies of the Jews planned to get rid of Nehemiah. After the breaches in the wall had been closed, but before the gates had been hung, Sanballat and Geshem sent messages to Nehemiah urging him to meet them in a village on the plain of Ono. Four times they sent, but each time Nehemiah answered: "I am doing a great work, so that I cannot come down; why should the work cease while I leave it and come down to you?"

The attempt to gain a chance to take Nehemiah's life having failed, they next tried what influence a threat of loss of reputation would have with him. Sanballat sent him an open letter, that all could read before it reached him, telling him of a report that he and the Jews were building the wall because they purposed rebelling and of his having appointed prophets to proclaim himself king, and threatening to make this known to the king of Persia unless he would arbitrate with them. They wished to make him afraid so that the work should not be completed, Nehemiah declared, and boldly he sent back word that no such things had been done, that they had invented everything. And then he turned to God for help: "Strengthen thou my hands," he implored.

Things were seemingly looking about as bad as they could look when the walls around Jerusalem had reached half their destined height. There was trouble within and without. The workers were discouraged, so weary and so faint-hearted that they declared they were not able to build any more of the wall. Their helpers, the Jews who had come from more distant places, received disheartening news from the men of their home towns, who came to them and kept saying over and over, "This work can't go on, it cannot; you must return with us and defend your own homes." And they knew that their enemies were planning a sudden attack and were confident of victory. Now was Nehemiah's time for coming on strong, and he did. He refused to be discouraged. He put heart in it.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—With the aid of the French Ambassador, M. Jusserand, a reformation in women's dress styles for 1918, with a saving of 25 per cent in the amount of material used, has been effected by the Commercial Economy Board of the Council of National Defence. Men's clothing styles also have been simplified, and, to a great extent, standardized, with a saving of about 40 per cent in material.

Faced with a shortage of wool, the Economy Board on the French Ambassador and explained that conservation of cloth was necessary to enable the nation to provide uniform for its armies. M. Jusserand communicated with his Government, with the result that the co-operation of the designers was secured. Whether dresses will be shorter of tighter or merely less elaborate, has not been announced.

In all cases where it is necessary to cut all use of raw materials, the War Industries Board and the Commercial Economy Board will work with the manufacturers rather than with the consumers. While the Economy Board frowns on the use of unnecessary belts and trappings, the public will not be urged to forego such luxuries, but the makers will be asked to stop their manufacture.

A NEW CEREMONY

CATTLE FOOD

Reeds, flax bolls, and dried potato peelings are being used in Holland for cattle food. High prices are demanded and request has been made to the Government to regulate the sale of these supplies and relieve the situation.

WANTS RELEASE OF RUSSIANS

LONDON, Nov. 29.—A Reuter despatch from Petrograd says that foreign minister Trotsky has written to Sir George W. Buchanan, the British ambassador, demanding the release of two Russian citizens, Chierin and Petroff by name, under arrest in England, characterizing them as self-sacrificing men of high ideals. He demands also the release of others under arrest. Trotsky alleges that many Englishmen living in Russia are openly engaged in political activity with the counter-revolutionary Russian Bourgeois and declares: "The revolutionary democracy cannot accept the position that worthy heroes of Russian revolution languish in concentration camps in England while counter-revolutionary British citizens suffer no restraint in Russian revolutionary territory."

to his people. "Be not ye afraid of them," he cried: "Remember the Lord, who is great and terrible, and fight." And by his own indomitable will Nehemiah triumphed; he won the victory over the discouraged workers, the discouraging friends, and the distressing foes, and soon he could report: "We returned all of us to the wall every man unto his work. One resolute man had come out; strong" and had outgeneraled the multitude.

Although Christianity is the gospel of peace, it is not the gospel of cowardice; and, although a man be a Christian, there are duties which he owes to his own soul, his own nation and his fellowmen. It may fall to his lot to hold the spear for other's work, or work while others hold the spear. Yet, whatever be a man's part it must patiently and bravely do his part if need be till the stars appear. Duty will not let you sleep. It calls you, it wakes you, it will not let you go. Whoever fears God fears to sit at ease as long as there is one wrong in the world to be righted, one truth crushed and trampled in the mire. True Christianity is the truest, manliest, great brave thing the world has ever seen; and it never feared nor needed to fear the drawing of the sword in a good cause, when nothing else could save righteousness from the bondage of the world.—Condensed from a Sermon by L.
