Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eight years of age may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live with a nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader is good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section on his homestead. Price \$200 per acre. Duties Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation, pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$500 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and homestead house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of drought, scrubby or stony and. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. CORY, C. M. G. NEWS TOPICS OF WEEK

Important Events Which Have Occurred During the Week.

The Busy World's Happenings Carefully Compiled and Put into Handy and Attractive Shape for the Readers of Our Paper—A Solid Hour's Enjoyment.

TUESDAY.

Ex-Ald. E. W. Barton of Toronto died in his 73rd year. Sir Wilfrid Laurier intends visiting Toronto next Monday.

Constantinople has again been bombed by a British air force. Five deaths from Spanish influenza have taken place so far in the Polish camp at Niagara.

J. A. Ellis, ex-M.P.P. for Ottawa, is slated for an appointment to the Ontario Railway Board.

John A. Calder, Liberal nominee for the North Oxford vacancy in the Legislature, was elected by acclamation.

The Canada Food Board has adopted the allied war loaf, and requires the use of 20 per cent. substitutes with wheat flour.

The Canadian War Trade Board has lifted the embargo on certain commodities, permitting them to be imported from Britain.

American Toronto took steps to form an organization to look after their interests in Canada, particularly in regard to Washington legislation.

All grain dealers in Canada must have licenses from the Board of Grain Commissioners, and not only those from Fort William west, as hitherto.

The Government will formally protest against and refuse to recognize the validity of the Long Sault water decision of the International Waterways commission.

The Zionist Council of Greater New York has announced a demonstration at Carnegie Hall next Sunday night to celebrate the liberation of Palestine by the British forces.

The Illinois and Japanese leadership have put the Bolshevik and Germans out of business in the Omer province of Siberia. Two thousand Austro-Germans were taken prisoner.

WEDNESDAY.

A Women's Party was organized in Toronto. Cadet Sylvester Nightingale of the R.A.F., Toronto, was drowned at Beamsville.

Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, has arrived in Paris.

Boston, Mass., schools have been closed for a week because of the epidemic of influenza.

The plan for the floating of the next Victory Loan will be similar to that of the last one.

Ontario County Council has agreed to arbitration on Oshawa's desire to secede from the county.

The Food Board says fruit affected by phenol on rubber rings of preserves jars need not be destroyed.

The Dominion and the Province of Ontario are to co-operate in the matter of settling soldiers on the land.

Curtailed of the manufacture of bicycles and accessories has been announced by the U. S. War Industries Board.

A snapshot taken in High Park, Toronto, was recovered from a German prisoner, and is again in Toronto.

Ministers of the Union Government are to devote time to public discussion of the Government's achievements.

Canadian casualties since the big offensive began on the 8th of August total 25,600, which, considering the extent of the efforts and its results, are the lightest since April, 1915.

Ratification of the treaty extending for a period of ten years the treaty of arbitration between the United States and Great Britain were exchanged yesterday at Washington.

U. S. Attorney-General Gregory has announced that unnaturalized German women may not enter or live in zones within one-half mile about camps or other military institutions after October 5.

THURSDAY.

Lt.-Col. Stephen Fairfield, of Colborne Bay, Kingston, died yesterday, aged 84.

The British advanced their lines and took possession of the village of Selency, immediately west of St. Quentin.

A party of Italian journalists now travelling through the United States have been invited to pay a visit to Canada.

German Chancellor von Hertling was hanged in the Reichstag on account of the unsatisfactory nature of his peace speech.

Giovanni Della Sandrara, a Toronto Italian, was murdered on his way to work, jealousy and revenge being the motives for the crime.

An Order-in-Council was passed in Ottawa providing for the trial and punishment of any men teaching Bolshevism doctrine in Canada.

A terrible explosion occurred in a powder factory at Platen, Saxony, and out of 6,800 women employed there, only 12 escaped without injury.

King George of England sent a greeting to King Peter of Serbia, congratulating him on the recent successes of the Serb troops in Macedonia.

Brazil and Austria have recalled their Ministers and these two countries are now in a state of war, although no formal declaration has been made.

It was announced in Ottawa that Mennonites coming to Canada from the United States must serve in the army. The pact with the Canadian Mennonites does not apply to them.

Five years in the Catholic Reformatory was the sentence handed out in Montreal by Judge Choquet to the boy of 14 years who was the author of a series of costly fires that during the past summer mystified owners and police alike.

years Minister of Municipal Affairs in Alberta and in the recent changes made Provincial Secretary, has resigned. He claims his reasons are those of business. He will still retain his seat in the Legislature.

FRIDAY.

The first snow of the season fell in different parts of southern and western Ontario.

Rt. Hon. Sir Robert Borden, Prime Minister of Canada, has left Ottawa for another holiday.

Brig.-Gen. Eric McQuaig, Montreal, has been awarded a bar to his Distinguished Service Order.

Survivors of broken Turkish army were driven into the arms of the Arabs by the victorious British.

Gen. Botha, who recently has been very ill, has been ordered to take special treatment and a lengthy holiday.

During the past few days there have been somewhat serious disturbances in Cascutia owing to Mohamadan ill-feeling.

The city of Frankfurt was bombed by the British airmen, who shot down five German machines that were defending the city.

Dr. Starr, consulting surgeon, Toronto General Hospital, has been appointed one of the consulting surgeons to the British force in France.

The Rt. Hon. Henry R. Wakefield, Episcopal Bishop of Birmingham, Eng., has arrived in New York to undertake a speaking tour in Canada.

Public irritation in Constantinople has become great, and rumors are spreading that the Ottoman Government may be forced to seek a separate peace.

Field Marshal von Sanders, commander of the Turkish forces, who fled from Nazareth shortly before the attacking British troops appeared, has reached Constantinople.

W. W. Wilder, 45 years of age, manager of Wilders Limited, one of the biggest furniture stores in Montreal, died on board a street car on his way home from the office.

The French and the American troops started a new offensive in the Champagne. The French advanced for and the Americans eight miles. Ten thousand prisoners were bagged and over 200 guns.

SATURDAY.

Meatless weeks will continue in Germany through November, December and January.

Canadians helped to score another big victory, when the Hindenburg line was broken near Cambrai.

The Chilean Government has ordered the naval authorities to occupy with armed forces all the interned German ships in Chilean harbors.

Maj.-Gen. Mewburn, Minister of Militia, accompanied by Col. Osborne, military secretary, has left for the west. He will visit the western military districts for the first time since he became Minister of Militia.

A large contingent of Serbian troops is operating with the Allies on the Murman coast in Northern Russia. Detachments of Serbians and Jugo-Slovaks are taking part in the operations of the Allied armies in Siberia.

Vilhelmur Stefansson, who recently arrived at Victoria after five years in the Arctic regions, whether he went at the head of the Canadian exploring expedition, is still in poor health. He has gone to Seattle to consult a physician.

Premier Malinoff of Bulgaria has asked the Allies for an armistice to consider terms of peace. Gen. D'Espercy has refused an armistice, but offered to refer to the terms on which Bulgaria will lay-down her arms.

Marquis Kinnochi Saloni, former Premier and President of the Constitutional party, has been commanded by Emperor Yoshihito to form a Japanese Cabinet in succession to that headed by Field Marshal Count Teruchi, recently resigned. It is probable Count Saloni will organize a Coalition Ministry.

Emperor William, Duke Albrecht of Wurtemberg and Prince Stephen of Schaumburg-Lippe, were in Mannheim last week when the British airmen raided the city. The royal party was staying in the royal palace, and the Emperor and his staff promptly took refuge in the cellar, remaining there twenty minutes.

An appeal has been entered by Gordon Wadson, of Toronto, acting on behalf of the United Farmers, who have taken up the case of sedition against J. F. Cross, a Brantford Township farmer. Cross was fined \$500 and costs by Magistrate Livingston for having declared, among other things, that a man might as well live under Prussian rule as under the present Government of Canada.

MONDAY.

John C. Swait, formerly a Toronto alderman, died at the age of 83 years.

Anti-German and peace demonstrations in Sofia have assumed serious character.

Miss Margaret Pringle, aged 17, of Owen Sound, was killed in an automobile accident in Markdale.

The American battleship Minnesota struck a mine off the Delaware breakwater. There were no casualties.

Mrs. Norman Keys, matron of the Sandford Fleming Hospital for Returned Soldiers at Ottawa, died of pneumonia.

The Bulgarian crisis has produced a panic on Berlin Stock Exchange, where several stocks dropped 30 points or more.

Capt. B. Robinson, M.C., a well-known Salvation Army officer, who served overseas as a chaplain before going into active service, was killed in France.

Although the strikers in the Clyde shipyards had voted by a small majority against returning to work, their executives have ordered them to resume operations.

Mayor Hawkins of Halifax has wired a protest to Ottawa against the landing of eight man-of-war sailors suffering with Spanish influenza. He says they should be sent to quarantine. His protest was sent to Col. Montizambert and Sir Robert Borden.
