There are many rumors as to what arrangements will be made by the stationing committee of the Methodist Church in regard to the appointment of a new pastor for Centenary church. Rev. Dr. Flanders is to go to Fairville, and Rev. G. A. Ross was to have come to Centenary, but the people of Centenary objected to this arrangement and expressed themselves as not being in favor of having the new minister.
