### THE MARKETS

**LIVE STOCK MARKETS**

Although there are but twenty cars of fresh stock on the two markets yesterday, trading was quiet. A fairly heavy supply of cattle was held over from Monday, and with the exception of small stuff sales were slow up to noon. Common cattle were in the majority. Prices on cattle held steady at Monday's decline, which was about 50c per 100 lbs., lower on the medium kinds than last week. Good cattle and very common ones did not suffer as heavily.

Veal calves were in demand and one lot of good stock sold for \$8 per 100 lbs., with the bulk of the sales from \$7 to \$7.50. Common at \$2.50 to \$3.50.

Good lambs brought \$8 and trading was fairly active. Common to medium kinds \$6 to \$7. Ewes, \$3 to \$4.

Hogs steady, but with a tendency to be weaker. Selects \$14 with a cut of from \$2 to \$4 on lights. Heavies and sows steady.

**TORONTO**

TORONTO, Aug. 19.—(Cattle)—Receipts 1,489. Buyers took about 1,600 head of cattle today at prices steady with yesterday. Trade was slow and 1,500 head are held over for tomorrow. A few heavy steers sold for \$7.85; two baby beefs brought 9 1/4c. Top price for butcher steers was \$6.85.

Quotations—Heavy beef steers \$7.30 to \$8; butcher steers \$6.75 to \$7.25; good \$6 to \$6.75; medium \$5 to \$6; common \$3.50 to \$7; medium \$5.50 to \$6.50; common \$3.50 to \$5; butcher cows, choice \$4.50 to \$5.50 medium, \$3.50 to \$4.50; canners and cutters \$1 to \$2; butcher bulls good \$4.50 to \$6.50; common \$3 to \$4; feeding steers, good \$5.50 to \$6.25, fair \$5 to \$5.50; stockers, good \$4 to \$5 fair \$3.50 to \$4.

Calves—Receipts 320 An odd choice calf sold at 10c, with the general top 9c. Trade was drab.

Quotations—Choice \$8 to \$9 medium \$6 to \$9, common \$2.50 to \$5; milk cows, choice \$60 to \$70; springers, choice \$55 to \$75.

Sheep—Receipts 1,999, lambs sold generally steady to a 1-c. lower in spot. Bulk went at \$9 and odd load at 9 1/4c.

Quotations—Lambs \$9 to \$9.25.

**COUNTRY PRODUCE**

A fair amount of business continues to be done in eggs for local consumption and there is also an improved enquiry from English importers for supplies for fall shipment. The tone of the market remains very firm, but there is no change in prices to note. The receipts yesterday were 2,678 cases, as against 1,844 for the same day last week and 2,652 for the corresponding day a year ago.

Wholesale jobbing prices were quoted as follows:

There was no improvement in the demand for maple product and in consequence the market remains quiet, with prices nominally unchanged, maple syrup being quoted at \$1.45 to \$1.50 per tin of one gallon, and maple sugar at 15c to 17c, per lb. as to quality.

The demand for potatoes was steady, and as supplies coming forward are not at present in excess of the requirements of trade the tone of the market was firm, with sales in a wholesale way at \$3 to \$3.75 per bag of 80 lbs.

**THE QUEEN OF COWS**

A new champion of the world is crowned for a year's production of butter. Bella Pontiac 46321 C. H. B., owned by a farmer near Brantford, in a year's production gave 1,587.70 pounds of milk, thus displacing Duchess Skylark Ormsby, whose record of 1,506.33 pounds has stood at the top since 1905. In making this record-breaking showing, Bella Pontiac produced an average percent of 4.66 percent butterfat. The record was supervised with the utmost care under the direction of the department of agriculture of the Dominion of Canada which supervises the record performances of all dairy breeds with a most thorough verification by the Holstein Friesian association of Canada, covering a total period of over nine weeks.

**INCREASE IN SECURITIES**

NEW YORK, August 17, 1921.—An increase of approximately \$150,000,000 in the market value of the principal outstanding securities issued by the British government, for war purposes, was a feature of the past half year in Great Britain. Detailed figures received by the Bankers Trust Company, of New York, from its English Information Service, indicate the following appreciation of values, in the period between January 1, 1921, and July 1, 1921, involving the more active issues:

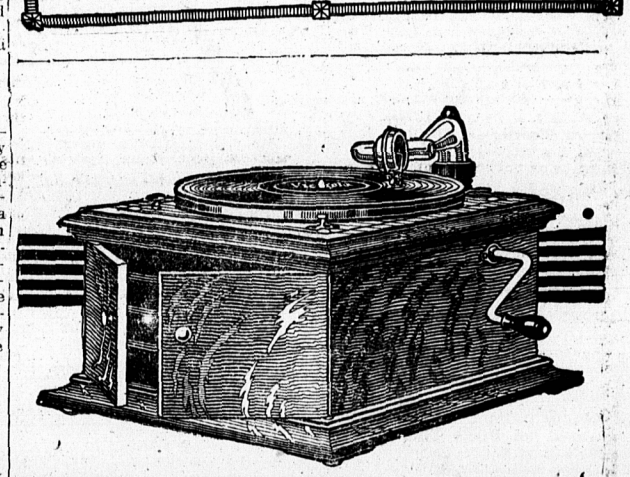
