CURES AT LOUDRES.

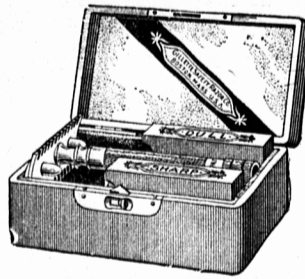

BACK FROM OLD COUNTRY.—Mr. and Mrs. H. C. NEW POSITION.—Miss Minnie Gaudet, teacher in the Primary Department of Tignish High School, has resigned her position to fill a vacancy on the staff of Model School Teachers, Charlottetown. Miss Gaudet has acquired a very high reputation in the teaching profession, being considered one of the best primary teachers in West Prince. She leaves for Charlottetown today. Miss Ida Christopher of Neil Pond, will succeed her in Tignish.—T.

RECORD CATCHES.—A large body of mackerel is in eastern waters at present, and it appears as if the natural increase has overtaken, in a measure, the destruction caused by the American seine which has been used less and less the last few years, as no fish could be found to seine. On the 12th inst. good catches were made from South Lake to Red Point, in fact the best for thirty years. Record catches were made at Basin Head, where Mr. William Coffin and Mr. Seth McLean had the distinction of hooking and landing over a thousand mackerel each, while Messrs. John Robertson, Arthur Neal and the La Purres landed large quantities.

A GIANT LOBSTER.—A fisherman at North Rustico last week made a great find—a monster lobster, which had evidently been washed ashore by the gale which had raged off that portion of the coast. It was alive when he found it—in fact, it was still alive when he brought it to Charlottetown on Saturday, and when it was seen by a Guardian representative yesterday at the office of Mr. J. J. Hornby, lobster exporter, Water Street. It weighed between 14 and 15 lbs., and from the tip of its tail to the end of its outstretched claw it measured 21 inches. Evidently it was of considerable age, sea moss was thick upon it while there was a bunch of considerable growth on one claw. That hump-like was inhabited by some member of the phylax family! Of course such a unique lobster is not destined for the ordinary fate of such fish. Mr. Hornby intends to have it prepared by a taxidermist and mounted on a board to add to the decoration of the wall of his office, which is even now adorned by another giant specimen of lobster, still larger than the recent capture, as it weighs 17 lbs. and measures 34 inches.

NEW PREACHERS.—Rev. J. L. Batty, of Zion Church, Winnipeg, who is known in Methodist circles in this Province, has commenced his ministry there very auspiciously. Large congregations attended his opening services on Aug. 24, and were delighted with his messages. There is a splendid church and equipment, with a fine choir, and a somewhat unique opportunity is afforded to a man of certain gifts. It is being predicted that Mr. Batty is the man for the place.

WEDDING BELLS.—A quiet but pretty wedding was solemnized at the Roman Catholic Church, Springhill, on Monday morning, Sept. 8th, when Miss Teresa McPhee was united in marriage to Mr. Joseph McLeod, now of Springhill, but formerly of Cape Breton. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Father Doody. The bride was charmingly habited in a tailored cream serge suit worn with large cream hat and black plumes. She was attended by her sister, Miss Alice McPhee in a navy blue cloth suit, while the groom was supported by his brother, Mr. J. McLeod of Glace Bay. The happy couple left on the eleven o'clock train for a two weeks' trip through Prince, Edward Island and Cape Breton. The bride's travelling costume was a suit of navy blue serge with cream hat.

NEW COURSE OF STUDIES.—A meeting of considerable importance as regards educational matters of this province was held Friday and Saturday last in the office of the Superintendent of Education, Mr. R. H. Campbell, who presided, the others present being the various Inspectors of Schools. The purpose of the meeting was to consider and discuss the work of the primary schools of the province for the ensuing year, and to arrange a new course of studies. It is considered that the present course of studies laid down for the primary schools is not helpful, and it is intended to bring in the necessary change. The meeting drew up a provisional course, which it is intended to submit to the judgment of the teachers. Circulars detailing the new course as proposed will be circulated among them for their criticism and for any suggestions of improvement that they may have to make, and when these have been received another meeting of the educational authorities will be held finally to settle the new course of studies. As the teachers convention later on this month will afford a splendid opportunity for the discussion of the proposed course, the circulars will be issued to the teachers before that event takes place.
