THE FIGHT FOR POSSESSION OF THE DARDANELLES

An Official Statement Tells of the Furious Fighting Along the Banks of the Dardanelles. The Turks Made Desperate Attacks all of which were Repulsed. Allies Consolidated all Positions Captured.

(Special to The Guardian) LONDON, July 2.—The full text of an official statement re the Dardanelles is as follows: General Sir Ian Hamilton reports that on the afternoon of June 29 hostile columns moving west from North Achi Babi and South from Kild Bahr towards Turkish right flank indicated that the enemy was preparing for a counter-attack against the position we captured previously. During the evening two mine galleries in front of our right centre were blown in, after which the enemy subjected our trenches to a heavy rifle and machine gun fire for two hours. GARLAND ANNOUNCES HIS RETIREMENT

(From our own Correspondent.) OTTAWA, July 2.—W. F. Garland, M.P., announced at the laying of the corner stone of a church in Carleton County that he would retire from public life. The member for Carleton stated that owing to recent events he had decided to retire. He wished to make an announcement first to the people who had elected him. He was followed by Reeve R. T. Richardson, of Woodroffe, Ont., who announced himself as a candidate for the seat. Mr Garland's retirement had been looked for after the revelations recently before the commission investigating war contracts under Sir Charles Davidson. He was read out of the Conservative party last session by Sir Robert Borden, but did not accept this dictum until the Government made it clear that he must. The commission will probably sit for two more weeks in Ottawa and will then go down to the Maritime Provinces to look into horse dealing there. It is understood that restitution of undue profits made in the supply of binoculars to the Government is coming as a result of the commission investigation of these matters.

FANATICAL MOSLEMS KILL THEIR OFFICERS

(Special to The Guardian) LONDON, July 2.—The killing of the Major, Captain, Lieutenant, and Bombardier, and the wounding of the Captain and Sergeant, all officers of the 8th Indian Cavalry, by two fanatical Mohammedans who were subsequently shot to death, is announced to-night by the Official Press Bureau. The 8th Cavalry of the Indian Army was stationed at India. The two men are reported to have been morose and of a fanatical disposition.

PORFIRIO DIAZ DIED IN FRANCE

(Special to The Guardian) PARIS, July 2.—General Porfirio Diaz, former President of Mexico, died this morning. General Diaz had been in falling health since reaching Europe in 1911 after his resignation from the presidency of Mexico, following the successful Madero revolution.

KING GEORGE'S GIFT TO YACHTSMEN

On it is inscribed, "Presented by King George V. to the Panama-Pacific International Exposition Regatta 1915."

P. E. ISLANDERS WIN IN ARTILLERY SPORTS

Splendid Showing by P. E. Island Battery at Dominion Day Artillery Sports in Halifax. Remarkable Exhibition of Efficiency in Gunloading.

(Special to The Guardian) HALIFAX, July 2.—The artillery sports held at Ives Battery on Dominion Day were a big success, over one hundred competitors participating. The greatest rivalry prevailed particularly in the gunloading competitions. The Island boys won them all putting up splendid exhibitions of drill and efficiency. On the six-inch loader Sergeant Seaman and Sergeant Leard's team tied with fifteen one-hundred-pound shells loaded and fired and misfire drill carried out perfectly in one minute. The Island boys also defeated the crack twelve pounder detachment from Hugenon's Battery, Bombardier Saunders' team loading and firing twenty-two rounds in forty seconds. They followed this up by winning the blindfold loading drill. In changing gun mechanisms they had a big lead, Lieut. Bayer's team doing the job in 37 seconds and Sergeant Laird's coming second in 41 seconds.

SPECIAL MEETING CITY COUNCIL

A special meeting of the City Council was held last evening in the Council Chamber. His Worship Mayor Sterns presiding. His Honor the Recorder, Mr. K. J. Martin, was in attendance. The estimates of the Receipts and Expenditures for the year ending December 31, 1915, were tabled. Councillor McNevin contended that the estimate of \$5,500 for maintenance of streets was hardly adequate and that it was near two thousand less than the estimate before. He thought that at least \$6,000 should be set aside for the streets. Councillor Riley said that the object of laying concrete sidewalks was to lessen the cost of wooden sidewalks. He pointed out that the item \$150 for squares was in the previous estimates and that it should really be added to the amount for streets, while it was expected that the Council would sell 2 horses in the fall. That would make up the deficiency which Councillor McNevin complained of. Next year it was expected more sidewalks would be laid down. He thought the estimate could be allowed to pass this year.
