The following particulars have been given The Guardian by Mrs. Geo. D. McLeod, Hunter River with reference to her brother's sad death: William McInnis of Quincy, Mass was literally pushed through the side of a building in which he was at work and was so terribly crushed that it is feared he will die. McInnis was employed at the polishing works of John Mason on Brook road, South Quinicy. On Feb. 11th, while wheeling a two-ton block of granite through the shop to one of the polishing machines, the stone toppled over and fell on McInnis. The latter was standing behind the block of granite and the side of the building when the stone fell over him, the impact was so terrific that the man's body was forced against the side of the building with such power that the boards gave way and McInnis was pushed through, with the big stone resting on top of him. Workmen in the shop rushed to the aid of McInnis and when they removed the stone they found him unconscious. A call for physicians and an ambulance was sent for, but the ambulance did not arrive first and took him to the city hospital, where he died on the 12th. He was 51 years old, a widow with six children are left to mourn.

Its baneful influence upon the righteous conscience is most destructive--you say "It is only politics" No man can take fire in his bosom and not be burnt--so the immorality of the party spirit is most destructive to the moral fiber of the people--The man who sells his conscience for a few dollars to uphold the party is not a safe man in this land of the free.
