LONDON, Dec. 18.—The question of marriages in fashionable London churches of couples who have no residential qualification in the district is being considered by the ecclesiastical authorities, following complaints made by vicars.

A vicar stated yesterday that the matter is receiving the attention of the Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr. Lang.

PRINTS NOVEL IN SMALL SPACE

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—A 100,000 word novel within the space occupied by four newspaper columns, and which can be sold for about five cents, is the accomplishment claimed by Rear Admiral Bradley
