The Central Guardian Henry Ford And Other Witnesses Called to Ottawa

(Special to The Guardian.) OTTAWA, March 14.—Henry Ford and other witnesses called to Ottawa today on the question of financial credits before the Parliamentary committee on banking and commerce. "We shall be glad to advance him money to get him along," joyfully remarked Chairman Maclean when the question of witnesses came up today. "But we should make him get back on his own feet," added Sir Henry Drayton, former Minister of Finance. It is also likely that Major Douglas, author of the Douglas Credit Scheme, will give evidence. Major Douglas is reported to be paying a visit to America shortly. Other witnesses to be called are H. S. Ross of Montreal and George Devington of Edmonton.

The committee decided on the report of a sub-committee, to leave the calling of witnesses on rural credits to the special committee on agricultural conditions. It was, however, understood that any witnesses called before the Banking and Commerce Committee might be questioned on this point.

Reduction in Coal Import From States

(Special to The Guardian.) OTTAWA, March 14.—Anthracite imported into Canada from the United States during the year 1927 amounted to 2,514,249 short tons, as compared with 4,567,370 short tons in 1921 and 4,912,964 short tons in 1926. Bituminous coal imported from the United States during the year amounted to 10,424,945 tons, compared with 13,536,250 in 1921 and 15,902,632 in 1926. For the first time in many years coal was imported from Great Britain about 917,000 tons being received during the year. Of this amount 178,000 tons were bituminous, 639,000 tons were anthracite.

Gelding Abandone Sets New World Record

(Special to The Guardian.) SAN DIEGO, Cal., March 13.—Abandone, the gelding recently claimed by C.B. Irwin, Saturday broke the world's record for a mile and forty yards, good for the time of 1:39.25. The gelding was ridden by the Th. Juana track in 1:39.25. The previous record was 1:42.15. Abandone covered the mile in 1:39.25, breaking the track record for that distance. Rebacke, his opponent, owned by Commander J.K.L. Ross, was three and a half lengths behind at the finish. Abandone carried 100 pounds and Rebacke 92. The winner was ridden by P. Martingale, the loser by Jacky Walsh.

Cattle for England Reach Montreal

(Special to The Guardian.) OTTAWA, March 14.—The first lot of store cattle in twenty years will reach Montreal tomorrow, Duncan A. Campbell, of Montreal, told the special house committee on agricultural questions this afternoon when questioned as to live stock shipments to Great Britain. "Shipments would be continued as long as you have the Fordney tariff on," Mr. Campbell said, although he thought the finishing of Canadian cattle at an English feed lot system, several steamers had been booked by English feeders, chiefly Norfolk men. The first would leave St. John's March 17 for Manchester. Cattle space from now till May 1, was practically all bought up.
