HAMILTON AND BULLER JOIN.

LONDON, June 22.—(Special).—Lord Roberts reports that Gen. Hamilton and Gen. Buller will join forces at Heidelberg, and then communications between Pretoria and Natal will be opened.

POWELL GETS 30,000 BOER RIFLES.

Baden Powell reports that Commandant Steyns has been captured and about 30,000 rifles have been surrendered in Rustenberg district.

AT KROONSTADT many rifles were surrendered.

AN OFFICIAL WARNING.

Advices from Pretoria say that an official warning has been issued to the effect that any further wrecking of communications will be followed by the demolition of the farms for five miles on both sides.

ARMORED TRAINS DOING DUTY.

A combined movement to surround General Dewet is proceeding. Meanwhile the line of communication is to be patrolled by armored trains.

Hurrying to Tien Tsin—Missionaries Slain, REGULARS NOT BOXERS

Are now Fighting—No News From Pekin or Admiral Seymour.

FOREIGNERS MASSACRED AT TIEN TSIN. SHANGHAI, June 22.—(Special).—Japanese sources report 1,500 foreigners have been massacred at Tien Tsin.

NO NEWS FROM ADMIRAL SETMOUR. LONDON, June 22.—(Special).—In the Commons to-day Under Secretary Broderick said no news had been received from Pekin, or from Admiral Seymour.

News had been received of hard fighting at Tien Tsin with some loss of life.

REINFORCEMENTS ARE BEING HURRIED FORWARD and the relief of Tien Tsin is expected tonight.

GREAT ALARM FOR MISSIONARIES. NEW YORK, June 22.—(Special).—The Methodist Foreign Mission Society has received a message from Hopkins, Brown and King that they were saved, and the fear is that all other missionaries, 24 in number, including many women have been massacred.

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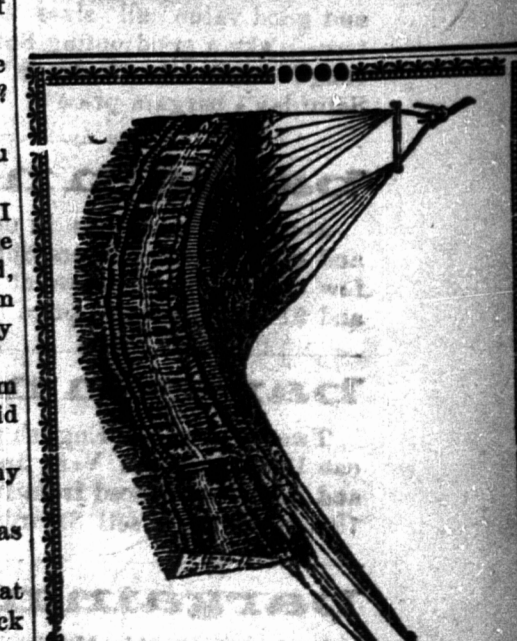
