THE PROVINCIAL BAN.—In connection with the influenza epidemic the Provincial Secretary has now to be filled by them indicating present conditions throughout the province. As soon as these forms are returned the Provincial Board of Health will be in a position to judge as to when it will be safe to remove the ban from church services and other meetings.

NOTICE.—As church services, fox and other meetings are advertised to be held in country districts, the attention of the public is drawn to the fact that the regulations regarding the influenza epidemic have not yet been lifted, and that until a notice removing such restrictions is published in the Press, meetings of all kinds and church services are not to be held. This does not apply to incorporated towns wherein the matter is left to the direction of the Town Council, which body also constitutes the civic Board of Health.

RETURNED SOLDIERS AND THE PREMIER.—After the celebration was over on the Square on Thursday evening the crowd remained and seemed to be anxious for more. A number of returned soldiers were quite anxious to entertain them and several of them addressed the audience. It was remarked that the Premier notwithstanding the rain which began to fall, remained on the platform with the soldiers till the end and after everything was over a number of soldiers surrounded the Premier and expressed their appreciation of his courtesy and also their thanks for the interest he has always taken in the soldiers and their parents. Thursday night's incident is only another proof of the good relations existing between the head of the executive in this Province and the soldier boys.
