December Rally Starts Rolling On Wall Street

NEW YORK, Dec. 5 (AP)—Wall Street had its December rally rolling at the week-end. In Saturday's short session gains of fractions to around 3 points were added to the advances of the previous three sessions. Oils, steels, rails and motors did better than most although demand was well spread throughout the list. Upward tendencies were accentuated in late trading and the market closed just about at the top levels of the week. Volume expanded on the way up. Turnover of 310,000 shares compared with 340,000 the previous Saturday and was the largest for a two-hour session in the last month. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks advanced 4 of one point to 64.4. The average now is back to where it was on Nov. 23.

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MONEY TO LOAN

MONTREAL, Dec. 5 (CP)—Selected industrials were fractionally improved at the close of the week's trading Saturday on the Montreal Stock Exchange and Curb Market. Mines were about mixed. Industrial sales were approximately 16,000 shares while mines totalled 148,000 shares. Leading averages showed banks off .05 at 27.58; utilities up .3 at 74.8; industrials up .2 at 131.0; papers up .60 at 342.07 and golds off .17 at 59.59.

At Montreal
A feature of the past week's trading was the sharp upward rise of selected issues—Algoma Steel and Winnipeg Electric. Algoma, opening at 50 Monday suddenly rose seven points Wednesday to 57 and then held its own for the remainder of the week, closing at 56 Saturday. The usually narrowly fluctuating Winnipeg Electric registered a weekly gain of 2-1/4 points from 31-1/4 Monday to 34 at the close of trading Saturday although it had reached a year's high of 35-1/4 Friday.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 5 (CP)—Cargos of grain showed a firm trend in quiet trade Saturday on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange. At the close oats prices ranged from 3-3/8 cents higher to unchanged, while barley prices were 1-4 cent higher to unchanged.
