DOVER, Del., Oct. 26.—Attracted to this state by one of the most liberal general incorporation laws found in the Union between 65,000 and 70,000 corporations throughout the nation today are doing business under Delaware charters. The features of the law which has made the state a Mecca to incorporators are few, but compelling. It is easy to comply with. It is speedy in operation. And it restricts the state's interest in, and supervision over, its charter holders to the apparent minimum compatible with the protection of stockholders.

## NOVA SCOTIA BRANCH OF A. A. U. OF CANADA IS FORMED AT MEETING

HALIFAX, Oct. 23.—By a vote of 13 to 1 Provincial representatives decided to form a Nova Scotia Branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada at a meeting of Provincial club delegates at the Board of Trade Rooms last night.

Before the meeting was adjourned provisional officers were elected as follows: President—A. C. Pettipas, Dartmouth.

1st Vice President, A. D. "Hump" Campbell, Sydney.

2nd Vice-President, Mr. Bishop, Kentville.

3rd Vice-President, Rev. Dr. Boyle, Antigonish.

Secy-Treasurer, J. F. McManus, Dalhousie.

Representatives appointed to the annual meeting of the Canadian A. A. U. are as follows:—President Pettipas, A. C. Millie, and A. L. Mercer, Sydney.

Only club delegates with power to vote for the club they represent were allowed to vote at the meeting. In these fifty-two clubs in Nova Scotia, but because of financial embarrassment, many of the clubs were unable to send a representative to the meeting. However, the meeting was assured, that in the majority of cases the clubs as represented at last night's session were in favor of the break with the so-called M. P. B. A. A. U. C. In one instance a Sydney club sent a letter to that effect.

The following resolution moved by A. C. Millie, and seconded by C. J. Burke, was carried:—

"Resolved, that this meeting hereby assembled, this 22nd day of October, 1926, in the Board of Trade Rooms, Halifax, Nova Scotia, representatives of amateur clubs in Nova Scotia formally establish a provisional set of officers with full power and authority to take whatever steps are necessary to bring about, at an early date, the formation of a Nova Scotia branch of the A. A. U. of Canada, for the purpose of controlling, promoting, advancing and encouraging amateur sport in Nova Scotia, and that representations be made to the annual meeting of the C. A. A. U. of C. to be held this year, for full recognition of such union apart and separate from the so-called M. P. B. A. A. U. C., and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Secretary of the C. A. A. U. of C. with a request that a hearing be given to delegates from this Provisional Amateur Branch at said annual meeting for purposes herein mentioned."

On the vote for the break with the M. P. B. A. A. U. C. the only dissenting club was Pictou A. A. C. Representatives present at the meeting were: Rockdale Club, Sydney M. A. Patterson; Westville, M. Muirhead; Y. M. C. A., M. Keete; Wanderers, A. C. Millie; Sydney A. A. C., Dan Morrison; Pictou, A. W. Harris; Halifax Baseball Club, W. J. O'Toole and R. J. Fisher; N. S. Technical College, A. L. Atwood and B. Currie; St. Joseph's, Halifax, A. A. Roberts; Crescents, M. P. Martin; C. J. Burke and P. C. Neville; St. George's Halifax, Alex. Ferguson.

Stock Not Taxed. Stock held by non-residents is not taxed, nor is it subject to an inheritance levy. The corporation itself has no income tax to pay.

Incorporation can be completed within 24 hours. The incorporators need not personally appear or even be named. They may attend their first incorporators' meeting by proxy; the minutes and stock ledger will be mailed to them anywhere in the United States. Stockholders and directors' meetings may be held anywhere.

Other powers of a Delaware corporation include issuance of any class of stock desired, with or without voting powers, and with no limitation upon the relative amounts issued or the rate of dividends.

Sees Soviet Hold On Russia Waning. WINNIPEG, Oct. 23.—The Soviet state in Russia is crumbling and at most it will survive for only a few other ten years, was the opinion expressed here today by Commissioner H. W. Mapp, international secretary of the Salvation Army. The Commissioner is in Winnipeg attending the forty-fourth annual congress of the Salvation Army.

"There are unmistakable signs of disintegration within the Soviet ranks, and a prodigious effort is being made to supplant Christianity in the lives of the people, with Communist teachings," Commissioner Mapp declared. The Sunday schools, he added, had become schools of communism and no religious education was allowed.

All energies were being directed on creating a disbelief in God in the minds of both adults and minors.

Commissioner Mapp was stationed in Russia at the time of the first revolution and during the subsequent uprising.

Referring to Great Britain, Commissioner Mapp asserted that there was a determination in the people as a whole to rise up and go forward, despite the coal strike and its undermining effect.

David I. Hughes, of whom Theodore Roosevelt said, "He was always up in front," has been appointed technical adviser for the filming of "The Rough Riders."

### Paris Experts See Draw For Dempsey In Fight Pictures

PARIS, Oct. 23.—Boxing experts, referees and boxers, who witnessed the first showing of the motion pictures of the Dempsey-Tunney championship fight at Philadelphia were agreed that Jack Dempsey would never have received worse than a draw had the fight been held in Paris.

"You could never have found three boxing judges in France to take the championship away from him on his showing against Gene Tunney, one expert said after viewing the pictures. The spectators expressed surprise to see Dempsey on his tip-toes and doing all of the forcing in the ninth and tenth rounds with the new champion backing away, when the reports received here had Dempsey being massacred in a country where the aggressive boxer is given the shade of a customary here, Dempsey received a bigger cheer than Tunney at the end of the film."

"Perhaps the film doesn't give an exact idea of the fight, but Dempsey certainly was not beaten so badly as reported," said Francois Deschamps. "Tunney had a shade."

"So this is what they call murder in Philadelphia," shouted one spectator as the film came to an end. The picture will be shown to the general public soon.

### Dundee Fractures Wrist in Battle

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 23.—An X-Ray photograph taken of Johnny Dundee's right arm revealed today the veteran New York boxer had re-fractured an old break during his ten round title bout here Tuesday night with Tod Morgan, junior lightweight champion. The report, issued by Dr. A. H. McNulty, said the radius bone in his right wrist had been fractured.

The accident happened in the second round when Dundee hit Morgan with a right to the face. From that time on, he never used the member, putting up a remarkable defensive fight.

### Some of U. N. B. Men On Crippled List

FREDERICTON, Oct. 23.—The Rugby squad of the University of New Brunswick has developed a considerable number of cripples and every effort must be directed towards getting them in condition for the hard match at Sackville on Thursday next when the western league will open, Mount Allison meeting U. N. B.

Keene, who has played two seasons with the red and black team, but who did not return to college the first of the term, has resumed his course and is turning out with the Rugby squad. A month's delay places him at a big disadvantage.

### Goes to Boston

MONTREAL, Oct. 23.—Manager Cecil Hart has completed a deal with the Boston Bruins whereby Billy Coward, who played defence on the Canadian National Hockey team, will be traded for Henry Moran, former Calgary and Vancouver defence man, it was learned today. Moran was bought from the Western Hockey League along with a number of other players.

### Colorful Boxer Goes

NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—The death of Harry Greb, the Pittsburgh "Windmill," takes one of the most colorful boxers from the ring game. Greb, whose real name was Harry Berg—his first name spelled backwards—was one of the most active men in the ring as well as one of the most fearless.

He fought in all divisions from middleweight to heavy weight and held title in both the American light heavyweight or 175-pound crown, as well as the middleweight championship. Record books show that he fought more than 250 battles in fourteen years of ring activity.

Greb was born in Pittsburgh 12 years ago of Irish-German parentage.

### Annual Meeting Of Canadian Body Here on Dec. 8, 9, 10

ST. JOHN, Oct. 23.—The annual meeting of the Canadian Amateur Athletic Union will be held in Saint John on December 8, 9 and 10, according to word from headquarters received here recently. The annual meeting was to be held early in September but the coming of the Federal elections postponed the gathering until later in the year. This will be the first time that an annual meeting of the Dominion body has come to the Maritime Provinces and it was largely through the initiative of A. W. Covey, the vice president and representative of the Maritimes, that the meeting was brought to the eastern provinces.

### Meeting in Halifax

Many matters of major interest will be considered at this meeting but from the standpoint of the Maritimes, the one of paramount importance affects the Maritime branch and the possibility that it may be divided into three branches. It is proposed to have separate branches for each of the three provinces and already strong movements to accomplish this end have been formed in New Brunswick, this movement, it is reported, commands a majority of the clubs in this district and already has elected provisional officers with Lieut. Col. Norman MacLeod at the head. In Nova Scotia, matters are expected to reach a definite conclusion tonight when provincial clubs meet in Halifax to elect provisional officers.

It is learned on reliable authority that changes in the personnel of the governing body of the M.P. B. are imminent and an announcement on the matter is expected shortly. These switches have been the subject of many rumors before this but it is believed that this time they are definite.

The gathering of the Canadian annual here is a distinct feather in Saint John's cap and strong committees likely will be formed to entertain the outside delegates.

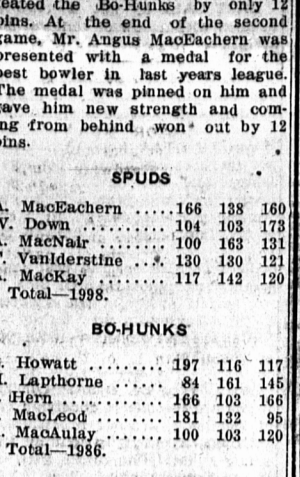
### SHIFTING OF COAL CARGO CAUSED ST. LAWRENCE DISASTER, CHIEF ENGINEER STATES
