CHARLOTTETOWN'S HISTORY SINCE ITS INCORPORATION.

(Continued from page Two)

Pownal Street known as the Bagnall Building and spread two blocks wide, until it was finally checked before destroying the building fronting on Great George Street.

"The troops in Garrison were early on the ground and worked splendidly, indeed all ranks and conditions did the same not omitting His Excellency the Lieut Governor, who put himself to any work, from forwarding water along the pipes to the removing of property from perishing houses.

A subscription list was started and over \$4,350 were paid by the citizens. The balance \$1000.00 was given by the Local Government.

The receipts for the year 1866 were \$11,491.07. The expenditure was \$11,568.7.

The sum of \$5,350.00 paid for the Steam Fire Engine, was not included in the city accounts, but was forwarded direct by the committee who collected the money.

The Market House which was built in 1866 was opened in January 1867. It was designed by the late Mark Butcher and

built by William and David Fraser at a cost of \$10,484.07. In the spring of 1867 the old Market House where for so many years the farmers and citizens met to buy and sell was taken down as it was no longer required after the completion of the new building.

old-fashioned scales with their wooden platforms and large weights stood at the western side, and over them above the door fronting on Queen street could always be seen the motto "A false balance is abomination to the Lord; but a just weight is his delight; Proverbs XI-1."

On the 18th of June 1867 the Hon T H Haviland, who had continuously filled the office of Mayor for ten years, died universally esteemed and respected.

A special election was held on the 28th of June 1867 and Theophilus Des Brisay Esq. was elected to fill the vacancy.

War 1, John Morris, Albert H Yates. War 2, James Reddin, Andrew Mitchell.

War 3, George R Beer, John Brecken. War 4, James B Pollard, Mark Butcher.

War 5, David Laird, D R M Hopper. The receipts for the year 1867 were \$12,904.46.

The expenditure was \$15,275.37. The election in August 1868, James Peake took the place of Albert H. Yates

War one, Archibald McNeill succeeded Andrew Mitchell in Ward two and W. Ballin was elected in the place of John Brecken in Ward three.

The receipts for that year were \$14,041.36 The expenditure was 14,000.22

The only changes in the Council in 1869 were the retirement of James Peake in Ward one and the election of Samuel Match, and the retirement of George R Beer in Ward three and the election of James Currie.

The receipts for 1869 were \$17,941.32 The expenditure was 17,878.84

In 1870 the changes in the Council were the retirement of Archibald McNeill and the election of William Murphy in Ward two and the retirement of James Currie and the election of George R Beer in Ward three.

The receipts for 1870 were \$17,080.61 The expenditure was 17,034.76

In 1871 Neil Rankin was elected in Ward one in place of John Morris, Francis McCarron was elected in Ward two in place of James Reddin, James Currie was elected in Ward three in the place of George R Beer, W E Dawson was elected in Ward four in the place of John Brecken and James H Fletcher was elected in Ward five in the place of David Laird.

The receipts for 1871 were \$23,875.91 The expenditure was 23,139.39

The census taken in 1871 shows the population of Charlottetown to have been 8,807.

In 1872 Neil Rankin Esquire was elected Mayor and continued in office for three years. The Council elected with Mayor Rankin in 1872 were:

Ward 1, Artemas Lord, Archibald Kennedy. Ward 2, William Murphy, Francis McCarron.

Ward 3, James Currie, W B Allin. Ward 4, W E Dawson, W D Stewart. Ward 5, J H Fletcher, H B Smith.

This council remained in office two years. The receipts for 1872 were \$30,034.70. The expenditure was \$30,223.55.

The receipts for 1873 were \$24,048.51. The expenditure was \$24,281.59.

In June 1874 John Lawson Esq. Q C D C L, who had without interruption filled the honorable position of Recorder of the City from its incorporation, died at his residence in Charlottetown at the advanced age of 75 years.

He was buried with civic honors and the Council present, at an address to his family expressing their feelings of profound regret for the loss of so efficient an officer.

In 1874 Artemas Lord retired from the Council for Ward one and Thomas Morris was elected in his place; William Murphy retired from Ward and John Quirk was elected in his place; two and W. D. Stewart retired from Ward four and Charles F. Harris was elected in his place. Robert Shaw was appointed Recorder and held office until February 1876.

The receipts for 1874 were \$22,837.85. The expenditure was \$22,870.88.

By a decision of the Supreme Court the Police Court was declared to be ultravires in as much as the Mayor and Councillors could not adjudicate in cases where the fines went into the coffers of the corporation.

In view of this fact in April 1876 the Legislature passed an Act providing for the appointment of a Stipendiary Magistrate for the City of Charlottetown, to preside over the Mayors Court and the Mayor's Court and to have the administration, and control of the Police.

In May following R. R. Fitzgerald Esq. was appointed Stipendiary Magistrate which position he filled until 1890.

Upon the resignation of Thomas Alley in 1875, Donald McKinnon, was appointed Chief Engineer of the City of Charlottetown. In November of this year a second Steam Fire Engine was imported by the corporation at a cost of \$3000. In 1875 Theophilus Des Brisay Esq., was

electd Mayor and the Council with him were. Ward 1, Thomas Morris, William Murphy.

Ward 2, John Quirk, Francis McCarron. Ward 3, James Currie, Wm B. Allin. Ward 4, Frank D. Beer, Charles F. Harris.

Ward 5, G. Charles Hooper, Henry B Smith. The receipts for 1875 were \$24,179.34. The expenditure was \$24,034.34.

As it was found "undesirable owing to the increasing size and requirements of the City of Charlottetown any longer to limit by Statute the amount or rate of assessment to be levied and collected for city purposes" the Legislature in April 1876 repealed all acts limiting the amount to be levied on real and personal property and gave the Council power to levy and collect such sums of money as they from time to time should deem necessary.

In 1876 Theophilus Des Brisay Esq., was again elected Mayor; Richard Heartz was elected Councillor in the place of W. B. Allin and George W. Welner was elected in the place of Dr. F. D. Beer.

The receipts for 1876 were \$43,111.51. The expenditure was 46,021.08.

The receipts and expenditures given above include the Debentures issued and redeemed during the period covered. The total debt at the end of the first twenty one years of the corporation's existence (31st January 1876) was \$18,144.41.

In reviewing the first twenty one years of the history of Charlottetown we see slow, but steady progress. Year by year the receipts and expenditures have steadily increased as improvements have been introduced and the citizens have advanced numerically as well as financially. Yet notwithstanding the progress made up to that time the streets were only indifferently lighted by gas lamps and but comparatively few sidewalks were laid. The "old town pump" stood at the corner of the block on every street to allay the thirst of men and beast.

With but very few exceptions the men who took an active interest in the affairs of the city, when it was incorporated a half century ago have passed from off the stage of action. But their influence and example lives and abides, and if the succeeding generations prove worthy of the heritage bequeathed to them by an honored ancestry we need have little fear for the future well being of our native city.
