Special Service At Bristol

The special service held at Bristol United Church on Sunday afternoon, May 16th was a twofold service of dedication. The day was fine and a large congregation assembled to join in the worship and to witness the unveiling of an honor roll and the dedication to the glory of God of the recently installed electric lights. The honor roll of some forty members of Bristol congregation who had volunteered for active service with Canada's fighting forces in World War II was prepared and hung in the church by the Young People's Union. Its unveiling took place during the reading of an address which paid tribute to those who made the supreme sacrifice and to those who suffered extreme hardship while overseas. In respect to the memory of those who had given their lives it concluded with one minute's silence followed by prayer. The pastor, Rev. Mr. Mercer, in dedicating the electric lights said, "may the lights be an inspiration to us in our worship as He who is the Light of the World." The congregation expressed appreciation of the efforts of Rev. Mr. Mercer and the church trustees in having these lights installed. The choir under the leadership of Mrs. Vernon Anderson provided suitable music for the day closing with the singing of an appropriate hymn of dedication.

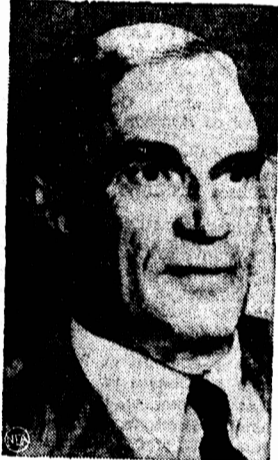
