Starvation Overseas. Henry W. Grady, a great American orator, once said of the liquor traffic, "It comes to snatch the crust from the lips of the starving child." This appears to be literally true today. On the Atlantic coast of Europe that about 21,465 cases of choice Scotch landed in Canada. On May 22nd from 8,000 to 10,000 cases landed in B. C. With millions of children starving in Europe and Old Land is exporting liquor made out of the grain which might have fed many of their hungry dying children.

Yugoslavia—Five million people rely entirely on UNRRA in many places the only food available is three slices of bread a day, etc.

In the face of this appalling situation, the Government still permits the brewers to waste, and worse than waste, vast quantities of grain in the production of liquid poison. While people of other countries are perishing for lack of bread, these gentlemen are taking the grain to poison their own countrymen and make money for themselves. One cannot conceive how any human being could be so callous and unfeeling.

The people as a whole submit to the rationing of butter, sugar, and without complaint, they give their garments to the National Clothing Collection and do what they can to support the Red Cross and other relief agencies; and now it is suggested that they purchase a few more bottles of liquor. It is the staff of life and the main diet of the poor. Does it not seem rather a cowardly expedient to take the bread from the mouths of the poor while the brewers are allowed to waste enormous quantities of grain in order to line their own pockets and indulge the rich in their "little drop"?

The nation that carries on in this fashion can expect to prosper, and what can we expect from a Government that breaks the laws of the country and illegally passes amendments?

People talk about plebiscites regarding Daylight Saving, the Flag, if they didn't realize that a plebiscite means nothing to our Government. In such things they are to blame. They are to blame for the wishes of the majority and will not be influenced by a desecrate minority.
