THE WESTERN TRAIN arrived at 10.40 last night, bringing the western mail of Thursday and Friday.

NEW OFFICE—Mr. W. P. Doull, was appointed chief Rabbi at the Philae Temple of Mystic Shriners held on Monday this week.

HAPPY NEW YEAR—Bandmaster McFarlane and the members of the 82nd Battalion Band extend to the people of Charlottetown and of the Province their hearty wishes for a bright and prosperous New Year. This expression of good will is prompted by the many kindnesses extended to the Band by the people of the city and Province.

BURIAL YESTERDAY—A large number of citizens attended the funeral of the late Mrs. J. A. Moore yesterday afternoon to the People's Cemetery. The services at the house and grave were taken by the Rev. Mr. Ferguson who spoke in touching terms of the deceased lady's many virtues as a friend, wife and mother. The pall bearers were Messrs F. H. Beer, Benj. Bremner, Charles Lyons, F. S. Hodgson, G. H. Holbrook and James Paton.

POLICE COURT RECORD—During the past year there were 258 convictions and 67 dismissals at the Charlottetown Police Court, a total of 325. In 1914 there were 324 convictions and 88 dismissals, a total of 412. Last year there were 158 convictions and 28 dismissals for drunkenness, compared with 226 and 24 respectively for 1915. Last year there were 25 convictions and 3 dismissals for breach of the Prohibition Act. The previous year the numbers were 38 and 35.

SUDDEN DEATH—Mr. W. W. Herring, aged 55 a well known and highly respected resident of Murray Harbor, died very suddenly about 4.15 Thursday afternoon. He was engaged in hauling seaweed from the shore, when he fell from the cart and immediately expired. Dr. Brehaut who was called pronounced death due to heart failure, and considered an inquest unnecessary. Deceased leaves a widow, one son Earl, by New Glasgow, N. S., and two daughters at home. The funeral notice will appear later.

S. S. EMPRESS—The S. S. Empress will make her last trip on the Summerside--Pt. du Chene route today after returning from Summerside tonight she will proceed to Charlottetown. The train will leave Charlottetown at 6 a. m. on Monday with mails and passengers to connect with the Stanley, which will start the service on the Cape Tormentine route. A special train will also be run on the N. B. and P. S. L. Railway to connect with the Ocean Limited train 199, West, and Sackville.

PROHIBITION AMENDMENT—By proclamation of his Honour Lieutenant Governor MacDonald the first section of the "Act to further amend the various acts relating to the prohibition of intoxicating liquors," will come into effect on the 15th day of January. The section referred to amends section 2 of said Act by striking out that part thereof which permits the sale of malt beer containing less than the per cent of Alcohol than that prohibited, the sale of any beer containing alcohol in any quantity.

KING GEORGE FARMER'S INSTITUTE—A meeting of this society was held at Murray River, on Dec. 27 the Vice-President Mr. E. G. Gidder occupied the chair.
