Buy New Steamers For Pasphebiac Route.

Sensation About Turner Ministry in B.C.—Outbreak of Scarlet Fever—Bad Accident to Judge Hanington—Newspaper Postage.

QUEBEC, Dec. 10.—(Special)—The Canadian Steamship Company has purchased from the North German Lloyd's Steamship Company the steamers Fulda and Wurra for the Milford Haven—Pasphebiac route.

The wharf at Pasphebiac is not ready and the steamer Gaspesia will go to New Carlisle to load.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Dec. 10.—(Special)—A sensation has been caused by the statement that the Turner ministry left the provincial debt, increased by a million and guaranteed bonds for the Fraser Valley Dyking Company to the extent of \$600,000, which have been taken over, necessitating heavy increased taxation.

HALIFAX, Dec. 10.—(Special)—Word from Bermuda says that scarletina has broken out on H. M. S. Renoua.

There has been many cases and the Admiral has transferred his flag to the Terror.

DORCHESTER, Dec. 10.—Last evening, while endeavoring to hold his horse, which had become terrified by the roar of escaping steam from the engine of the west bound freight at the depot, after the arrival of the Maritime express, on which he had returned from Moncton, Judge Hanington was thrown to the frozen ground beneath the frightened animal, and after being

dragged several feet was run over by the heavy buggy.

The horse, being free, made its way home, and the judge was conveyed to his residence in a coach. His honor's injuries consist of a bad wound on the left knee, a bad bruise on his left arm, and other bruises on his leg and side.

OTTAWA, Dec. 10.—The Post Office department will issue a circular in a few days to newspaper publishers explanatory of the mode in which newspaper postage will be collected after the first of January.

A newspaper employe must accompany each batch of papers and present a departmental form filled out with the net weight of the papers, the postage due, and present on this form stamps for cancellation.

TWICE HANGED.

Banged Execution of Anderson, at Norfolk.

NORFOLK, Va., Dec. 9.—John Anderson, the condemned murderer of Mrs. Saunders of the schooner Olive Pecker was executed in the city jail at 3 p. m. to-day. After prayer by Rev. J. P. Merritt, who kissed him good-bye Anderson made a short speech, saying he had forgiven the men who swore his life away, and would die in peace with the world and God.

He spoke pleasantly and smiled at the death watchers and to the crowd below and in a firm voice said: "Am Ready." At 3.06, the trap was sprung and Anderson's body shot downward. The rope parted just inside the knot and his body fell to the cobblestones. A doctor was called and soon Anderson opened his eyes and it was said started to breathe. He was carried feet foremost to the platform and laid down until a chair was obtained. He was then placed in this, but he never spoke. Preparations for re-banging him were hurriedly made. The other end of the rope was adjusted around his neck. He was then raised to a standing posture and the straps placed on his limbs.

While supported by the officers the trap was sprung the second time. In 23 minutes life was pronounced extinct. Nine minutes elapsed between the first and second drops. Anderson's neck was broken, supposedly by the first drop.

The Queen Gives £250 Towards it.

Prince of Wales Opens Cattle Show—The Queen Takes Prizes—Agitation Against Docking Horses—Shamrock Yacht Being Built Secretly.

LONDON, Dec. 10.—(Special)—The Queen has given £250 to the Gordon Memorial College at Khartoum.

The Queen has built a cabin to the Sailor's Rest at Devonport and Miss Weston, a worker among the sailors, says Her Majesty wept when she told her stories of the sailors' gratitude.
