### THE OFFICERS NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR NEWSPAPER LIBEL

NEW YORK, April 7.—Officers of a newspaper corporation cannot be held personally responsible for the newspaper publication of libellous matter. Such was the decision of the appellate division of the supreme court, today in the case brought by John D. Rockefeller, jr., against S. S. Carvals, president, Bradford Merrill, treasurer, and Edward H. Clark, secretary of the Star company, publishers of the New York American. The court orders all proceedings against them dismissed.

As officers of the newspaper corporation, Carvals, Merrill and Clark were arrested on the charge of criminal libel. The newspaper article for which it was sought to hold them responsible, related to alleged abuses of workmen of a corporation which it was alleged John D. Rockefeller, jr., controlled.

### WOMEN TO FILL MUNICIPAL OFFICES

DENVER, Col., April 6.—Thirteen women will head important municipal offices in Colorado as a result of Tuesday's elections. Pueblo, the second largest city in the state, elected a woman auditor, Leadville, Telluride, Idaho Spring, Greeley and Montrose, elected women treasurers, as did also the smaller towns of

Fairplay and Hildreway, Colorado city and Las Animas elected city clerks, and Durango a woman alderman.

The little town of Alma will have two women officials—the city clerk and treasurer.
