N. S. Schooner Long Overdue

BANGOR, Me., April 4.—(A.P.)—No word had been received here up to today from the schooner Irene and Myrtle overdue more than a week with a cargo of 250,000 feet of lumber for a local consignee.

The little vessel set sail from her home port in Weymouth, N. S., March 22. Ordinarily she would have sailed up the Penobscot River three or four days later.

In spite of their failure to hear from the vessel, local shipping men are disinclined to fear for its safety. Chlorine Gas Causes Panic

SHANGHAI, April 4.—(A.P.)—Clashes of growing intensity between Chinese and Japanese troops along the battle line west of Shanghai were reported today, adding to the difficulties facing negotiators of an armistice who were scheduled to meet again at 2 p. m.

Chinese reports from the area where the Chinese and Japanese forces have been facing each other since the cessation of hostilities here a month ago said skirmishes were occurring frequently, causing increased tension on both sides.

The peace negotiators of China and Japan were said to be "in somewhat closer agreement" when they adjourned over the week-end but their opposing attitudes on the main issue of troop withdrawals remain unreconciled.

"Dirty seed" is defined by the Dominion Seed Branch as meaning seed that contains noxious weed seeds in such quantity as to pollute the land with weeds that are difficult and costly to eradicate.

One of the principal mediums for the distribution of weed seeds in Canada is dirty seed, because of the fact that most of the noxious weeds have seeds of about the same size and shape as the seeds of clovers and grasses, and hence are difficult to remove. This reason alone should be sufficiently important with the intelligent farmer to ensure the preference which is due it for inspected seed.

Pope's Sunday Message Broadcast

VATICAN CITY, April 4.—(A.P.)—Pope Plus XI Sunday broadcast from the Vatican radio station a blessing upon those striving for better relations among nations.

The Pontiff encouraged efforts to relieve "universal suffering" at the conclusion of an address in connection with the reading of a decree celebrating the virtues of the French nun, Alice Le Clerc. The decree was a step toward ultimate beatification.

"Since such a favorable opportunity presents itself to us," the Pope said, "we wish to bless and we do bless all those who with sincere desire for the common good worked for restoration of mutual trust among peoples in these days of universal uncertainty and universal suffering."

The Pontiff's broadcast was in Italian, and paraphrased to English by Mgr. Francis J. Spellman of Whitman, Mass.

Daughter Kills Aged Mother And Self

AMESBURY, Mass., April 4.—(A.P.)—Miss Marjorie Jewell, 66, today shot and killed her 88-year-old widowed mother, Mrs. Marianne Jewell, and then ended her own life.

Medical examiner P. J. Mullen said he had been informed the daughter had lost her savings in the stock market and feared she was going to lose her position in a Boston real estate office. He said it was his opinion that Miss Jewell had become temporarily insane.

Miss Jewell roomed in Boston, but visited her mother week ends at the home of Mrs. Hattie Sands, where Mrs. Jewell was a boarder. Mrs. Sands said the daughter came down to breakfast at about 7 a. m. and appeared normal. After she returned to her mother's bedroom, Mrs. Sands said she heard a sound like an automobile muffler explosion. When it was repeated, she became alarmed and went up to the room.

She found the mother in bed, dying from a bullet wound in her temple, and Miss Jewell on the floor, dead from a bullet wound in her head. An old fashioned revolver was clutched in the daughter's hand.

The medical examiner said the mother apparently had been shot while she slept.

The Jewells formerly lived in South Hampton, N. H. Mrs. Jewell's husband died about a year ago. The only other near relative is a second daughter, Mrs. Adelaide Ferdinand of Winthrop, Mass.
