The Scottish Farmer reports the result of a series of graft sales of Aberdeen Angus cattle held recently in Scotland and England. After speaking of the growing popularity of these cattle, throughout Great Britain as evidenced by the keen demand and high prices obtained at the recent sale, it has the following to say regarding the sale of 32 head from the herd of Sir George McPherson Grant, at Ballinablock—one of the oldest and most noted herds in the world:—"The home of the Ericas and the happy hunting ground of the Prides and the Heather Blossoms was reached Tuesday. There was a great attendance and a still greater sale. The demand never lagged from start to finish and although most were prepared for some big prices, no one thought that the prices would have been so uniformly high nor the bidding so brisk. The Ericas and Prides met a great sale and the supply was nothing like equal to the demand. The averages made by these cattle have never been exceeded. An average of over £95 (or about \$475) for 32 head will take some beating. Then follow the sale list. Several of the cows and heifers brought close upon \$100. These prices are all the more remarkable when it is remembered that it was a draft sale and that the best animals were not offered.
