ANGLO-FRENCH LOAN IS OVERSUBSCRIBED BY FIFTY MILLIONS

ALLIES LANDING AT SALONIKI

BULGARIAN SOLDIERS ARE DESERTING IN LARGE NUMBERS

PARIS, Oct. 3.—A despatch received from the Serbian frontier announces that German troops have relieved the Austrian forces on the first line along the bank of the Danube, according to the Petit Parisien's Bucharest correspondent.

TEUTONS WITHDRAWN FROM EASTERN FRONT

BUCHAREST, Oct. 1, via London, Oct. 4.—(Delayed in transmission). Two hundred and fifty thousand Austro-German troops with 2,000 guns, mostly withdrawn from the eastern front, already have arrived on the Serbian frontier, and preparations for an attack are being hurried forward.

NO ANSWER YET FROM MR. FORD

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 4.—General Hughes said this evening that he had not yet received a reply to a wire which he sent Henry Ford, the American automobile manufacturer, yesterday asking him if it was true that he had stated, as reported in the press, that he was opposed to the Franco-British loan and that he would withdraw business from any bank which participated in the loan.

Enormous Craters

"The result of the three days' bitter battle was the complete levelling of our trenches. They had disappeared completely, but twenty metres behind them a new and strong position had been made, notwithstanding the enemy's fire. The craters caused by the explosion formed the dividing line. This side of them we held; on the other edge were the English. Attacks undertaken in the night by both sides failed every time. The losses of the English must have been fearful, but we also did not maintain our positions without paying a heavy price."

SUMMARY OF WAR SITUATION
