MOVING PICTURE SHOWS AND SUNDAY LAWS.

Montreal has a large number of moving picture theatres that are kept open on Sundays in defiance of law and the fines imposed. At first these fines were comparatively light, but at the last session of the Legislature power was given to increase the fine to \$100 in the discretion of the judges. Recently they were warned that hereafter the maximum fine would be imposed if these theatres were kept open on Sundays.

The Montreal Gazette tells that despite these warnings almost all the proprietors of moving picture shows kept their places open last Sunday. One proprietor who had already been fined five times intimated that he would willingly pay the maximum fine every week rather than close his theatre. It is explained that with an attendance of 4,000 to 5,000 at these Sunday entertainments they make from \$250 to \$300 profit, because it costs them little to keep open the additional day.

These conditions apply to that portion of the city east of Bleury Street, in which the population is almost exclusively French. Most of the halls west of Bleury street have been closed for several Sundays past. But in the open section there seems a deliberate purpose to continue the business. One proprietor is reported as saying, "We would prefer to pay \$5,000 a year in fines and keep open, and they cannot change the law till another session of the Legislature."

It will be seen that the law passed increasing the fines has not had the desired result, because it is profitable to break the law. In fact the fines from this source appears to be forming an important addition to the public revenue, and it is hinted that for this reason the fines will not be increased sufficiently to become prohibitory. At present there is no other provision for penalties except by way of fines, and the Sunday theatre seems to be pretty much on a par with the liquor trade so far as observance of law for moral reformation is concerned.

KING EDWARD AND THE SUFFRAGETTES.

Premier Asquith has persistently refused to receive deputations from the gallant gentlemen in Europe and is also held in repute for his wisdom. What will he do? Will he officially decline the proffered visit, or snub the ladies by sending out word that he is "not at home," or will he graciously receive them? THE NEW OCEAN PORT OF FISHGUARD, WALES.

Comparatively few persons in this or London will save six hours by the new arrangement, and the same on the return journey. The swift liners of the great Maurtania and Lusitania, touch at Queenstown, on the South coast of Ireland for the mails. Fishguard is 102 miles nearer Queenstown than Liverpool is. So, before the close of the present month the new terminal port is to be adopted, and we shall have frequent mention of it in future. It is but a small place at present, but will grow. It can be found on a good map of the west coast of Wales almost under parallel 52.

LORD ROSEBURY, THE LOST LIBERAL LEADER.

The announced separation of Lord Rosebery from the Liberal party in England is an event of more than ordinary significance. He was a Liberal of the Gladstonian school, an ardent admirer of that great statesman, his colleague in successive Liberal administrations and was chosen to succeed Gladstone as the party leader on that statesman's retirement in 1894. His first public speech was made in 1871 when he was selected by his leader to second the address in the House of Lords at the opening of Parliament.

A SANER FOURTH OF JULY.

It must be a source of sincere gratification to our neighbors of the Republic that the number of the killed and injured in the recent independence day celebration was scarcely more than a quarter of the total in some previous years. Usually the number of killed and maimed was comparable to the casualty list of a considerable battle. In forty years they would make "an ear-quake's spoil" equalling that of Waterloo.

The change has been brought about largely by newspaper advocacy and the ordinances of towns and cities discouraging the use of fire crackers, explosives and firearms and the substitution of processions, sports and games in celebrating the day. There are hopeful indications that the reform will extend and become permanent. We in Canada have much to learn from our energetic and progressive neighbors in many ways. But in celebration of our national holidays, our royal birthdays, Dominion Day and Empire Day we have as a rule, avoided noisy excess and had few fatalities or injuries resulting therefrom.
