Opposed To Protests in Football Matches

Dr. H. T. DeWolfe, Acadia, one of the committee dealing with the Mt Allison-U. N. B. football protest, has issued the following statement: The meeting which convened at the Hotel Dufferin, St. John, to consider the protest made by the Mt. Allison football team against the University of New Brunswick football team, was adjourned because the referee, Mr. Allen, had not been notified of the meeting, and no statement as to his ruling on the point at issue and explanation of it had been procured. It was decided to leave the matter to the Acadia representative, who should secure such statement from referee Allen and communicate the same, with his opinion as to the decision to be rendered, in view of the added information, to the other two colleges concerned.

From the referee it was learned that the two teams concerned were playing under strictly English rugby rules; that these rules did not permit the referee to award a try in case of interference by a player of the opposite side, unless the ball has already crossed the goal line, where the players are contending for its position.

Second—That in the referee's judgment, when the Mt. Allison players were interfered with, he was already in touch.

Third—That he blew his whistle, not as recognition of, or unpunishment for an interference on the part of a U. N. B. spectator with the Mt. Allison player who was carrying the ball but as a punishment for unlawful interference on the part of a U. N. B. player with a second Mount A. player who was following the player ahead of him, to secure a pass, if such pass were necessary.

In view of these points, and also recognizing the fact that the information brought before the committee as to the position of the Mt. Allison player when interfered with was contradictory it seemed to the Acadia representative, that there was no legitimate ground for the protest. Having

therefore communicated this statement, by phone, to Prof. Stevens, the U. N. B. representative, and Dr. Bigelow, the Mt. Allison representative, I felt it incumbent upon me, as chairman of the committee, to make this an official notification and explanation of the case. Prof. Stevens agreeing with the position taken by the Acadia representative, the decision inevitably went against Mt. Allison, and it was officially decided that the protest of Mt. Allison against the University of New Brunswick cannot be sustained.

Further, in informal consultation, the three representatives agreed that it should be urged strongly though perhaps not officially, upon the Athletic Association of the three colleges involved, that hereafter, no protest, under any circumstances, be made and that some satisfactory agreement among the colleges be arrived at, that this recommendation be carried into effect.

MORNINGSTAR WINS AGAIN

CHICAGO, Nov 23—Ora Morningstar defeated Roger Conti, of France, today in next to the final game of the 18.2 balk line championship billiard tournament, 400 to 123.

Conti during the early part of the contest played his poorest game of the tournament.

CHICAGO, Nov 22—The world's 18.2 balk line billiard championship play will end today when Willie Hoppe, world's champion, and Young Jake Schaefer, meet in the final game, Roger Conti, champion of France, and Ora Morningstar also will play this afternoon. Hoppe has won five matches and its only player of the tournament who has not lost a match. His closest call came last night when Cochran led him in the tenth inning, but Hoppe rallied, shot a 91 and made his necessary 400 points.

Schaefer has played five games, losing one of them. A victory for Schaefer over Hoppe tonight would throw the two into a tie and necessitate an extra game to decide the title.

CHICAGO, Nov 23—Willie Hoppe, world's 18.2 balk-line billiard champion, lost his first championship match since 1912 when he was defeated tonight by Jake Schaefer, of Chicago, 400 to 26 in the international tournament being held here. The victory gave Schaefer a tie with Hoppe for first place and the title will be decided in an extra contest to be played tomorrow night.

—PROPOSAL FOR FURTHER PARLEYS MADE BY CANADA WINS APPROVAL—It is learned tonight that Canada's proposal for the holding of further conferences with the object of perpetuating the idea or armament limitation will likely meet with the approval of a number of the British Empire delegates, though no information is available as to when it will be placed before the General Conference. It is anticipated, however, that it will be brought forward at a later stage of the proceedings. The proposal appears to have aroused a great deal of interest, and the general belief is that it would assist in a very large measure in maintaining the great purpose for which the conference has been called. It would provide a means for meeting changing conditions, and for dealing with any new means of carrying on warfare which may be invented from time to time. Canada, it is considered certain, will support the Mother Country in opposing an excessive allowance of submarine tonnage. Canada's position on this question is understood to be that it would be advantageous to the world if some plan could be reached of disposing altogether of the U-boat method of warfare.

In the Far Eastern section of the conference Canada's voice will be heard, though no indication has been given as to details of policy. It is not considered that the Dominion has any interests in the Far East distinct from the rest of the Empire—apart, that is, from Canada's position on the Anglo-Japanese Alliance, which is not shared by some of the sister dominions. It is not considered likely at this stage that the question of immigration will be brought before the conference, but if it is, Canada of course will be one of the vitally interested nations.

Northcliffe Papers Demand Scrapping of Anglo-Japan Treaty

LONDON, Nov. 24.—The Northcliffe newspapers today strongly demand that the Anglo-Japanese treaty be scrapped forthwith. The London Times argues that the existence of the treaty "is contrary to British interests, impedes cordial understanding between the United States and Great Britain, and generally hinders peace."

"It must be cleared out of the way," continues the paper, "and the sooner the better for the prospects of the Washington conference, better for the Anglo-American understanding, better for the peace of the Far East and the world, and better also for Japan."

The Daily Mail contends that the treaty, in recent years, has been "a source of mischief to China, encouraged aggression by Japan militarists toward China, and thus has been dangerous and prejudicial to the greater welfare of Japan herself. It has also been prejudicial to the good relations between Britain and the United States and unpopular in the Dominions."

"It has outlived the period of usefulness," the Mail says, "and for sound imperial reasons should be denounced by giving the required notice before final decision is reached at Washington respecting a settlement of the Pacific question."

AGED 86 BUT ABLE TO BATTLE

An unusual combat is reported from Green Cove, Victoria County, where two citizens, one aged 85, and the other 60, got heated up in a political argument. The elder issued a challenge and they met the following day in due form and mixed it up briskly. Victory finally perched on the banner of the 86 year old veteran, who in his younger days was a celebrated exponent of the fistic art. After the battle, the winner issued a general challenge to all resident of the County over 50 years old to race him any distance from one to five miles.
