A BATTLE IN MASSACHUSETTS

BOSTON, MASS., Nov. 3.—A large question mark symbolizes the political situation in Massachusetts at the close of the annual State campaign today, and the answer of the voters to the inquiry who will be governor, which is to be decided at the election tomorrow, is awaited with an interest surpassing that felt in the Bay State in a long time.

Seven candidates are contesting for the governorship. Governor Eugene N. Foss, now finishing his third term, is seeking re-election as an independent candidate. The Republican nominee is Congressman Augustus P. Gardner, well remembered as one of the leaders of the insurgent movement against Speaker Cannon. The Democratic standard-bearer is David I. Walsh, the present lieutenant governor. Charles S. Bird, a millionaire manufacturer of Walpole, who heads the Progressive ticket, completes the list of those in the running. The Prohibition, Socialist and Socialist Labor parties have named candidates, but they are not expected to figure conspicuously in the results.

The six parties have candidates for all State offices, but the Democratic and Republican are the only ones that have candidates in all the senate and representative districts. In some of the representative districts the Democratic candidates.

The independent candidacy of Governor Foss, who filled his nomination papers only an hour before the legal time limit expired, complicated the situation to such an extent as to render all forecasts of the election results little better than guesses.

With the Republican party split, Walsh, the Democratic candidate, was generally picked as an easy winner before Foss got into the race. But it is difficult for disinterested observers to escape the conclusion that a man who has been three times elected governor by the Democratic party and who runs as an independent because he had a falling out with the party "machine," among other reasons, will not draw a large number of Democratic votes away from the regular nominee of that party. It is considered likely, moreover, that many business men irrespective of party will vote for Foss because of his challenge by word and deed to organized labor.

The possibility of Foss cutting into the Democratic vote has given courage to Gardner and Bird, the Republican and Progressive candidates, respectively.

The campaign has been conducted almost wholly on State issues. At the same time the election is of national interest, chiefly because the

future of the Republican and Progressive parties must be tremendously affected by the results.

With former President Roosevelt far away from the country the ability of the Progressive party to stand alone is put to its severest test. A good showing at the polls will augur well for the future of the new party. On the other hand, a marked falling off in the Progressive vote will be interpreted far and wide as evidence of the temporary character of the third party and will have an important bearing on the situation involving the congressional campaign of next year, not to speak of the presidential contest in 1916. With a full realization of the importance of the campaign in this respect, both the Republicans and the Progressives have brought their leaders of national prominence into the contest.

If the Democrats win under the circumstances it will not be a matter of tremendous import, for the Democrats have been electing their gubernatorial ticket with considerable regularity for some years past, rock-ribbed as the Old Bay State has been supposed to be in its Republicanism.

In view of the fact that Mr. Walsh is not committed to an endorsement of President Wilson, his victory could not, therefore, be regarded as a vote of confidence for the administration, and if he is defeated the administration leaders would immediately put out the statement that the defeat of Walsh was in no sense a rebuke for the President, because national issues were not involved, but rather that it was a rebuke of the Democratic ring for refusing to endorse President Wilson.

MOVED 70,000,000 BUSHELS OF GRAIN IN TWO MONTHS.

WINNIPEG, Nov. 2.—In the month of October, the Canadian Pacific railway moved 28,000 freight cars from Winnipeg to Fort William, the greater portion of which contained grain. To date, since Sept. 1, there have been loaded on the Canadian Pacific railway lines in the west 48,940 cars of grain, 31,514 of which were loaded with wheat. The total grain moved this year from Sept. 1 to Oct. 31 is 70,000,000 bushels. Eighty three million bushels of grain were marketed at stations on the Canadian Pacific western lines since Sept. 1, three-fourths of the grain marketed being wheat. In the same period last year 40,000,000 bushels were marketed.
