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## LIST OF WAR GUILTY HANDLED TO BERLIN

List includes 46 Names and Death Sentence is Demanded in Some Cases. Leipzig Tribunal is Being Carefully Watched.

(Dom. Press Special.)  
PARIS, March 14.—The Allied list of war guilty has been handed to the Berlin Government it was learned today. The list totals 46 names. The death sentence is demanded for each of the accused. The Allies reserve the right to take other members in each case if they consider the finding of the

German tribunal at Leipzig, before which accused will be tried as un-equitable. The list it was understood, includes the names of Enver Pasha, former leader of the Young Turk Party and now understood to be in league with Turkish rebels, and Talaat Pasha, former Turkish Grand Vizier. Both accused Turks are said to be in Berlin.

## NEAR EAST TANGLE GROWS SERIOUS

The Situation is Causing the Authorities Some Anxiety. The Arabs May Join the Turks.

(Dom. Press Special.)

LONDON, March 13.—Earl Curzon's speech on the Turkish problem, made in the House of Lords yesterday and other official and unofficial statements on the subject are generally regarded as showing that the Near East tangle is quite created by complications threatening some anxiety—an anxiety increased by complications threatened in connection with Syria and Mesopotamia. The shadow of Indian and Moslem opinion darkens the problem, and it is believed, influences the counsels of the Allies more than is always immediately apparent.

The suggestion that the employment of force against the Turks might excite general hostility in the Mussulman world is regarded as one that cannot safely be ignored. In some quarters the feeling prevails that, there is danger if the Turks are pressed they may immediately be joined by the Arabs. Careful watch is being kept here on the outcome of the Syrian congress at Damascus, and it is understood any decision or proposal by the "Peace Conference" regarding Syria would be purely tentative. Reports are current that Bolshevik activities, directed against the Allies, have dropped out in co-operation with the Turkish nationalists and in nearer India. It is said that specially trained Bolshevik propagandists have installed printing presses at Afghanistan, where pamphlets, written in the vernacular, with a view to undermining British authority in India and stirring up

trouble on the Afghan border, are being produced.

Alive With Warships.

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 13.—Numerous despatches from London and Paris announcing that the Supreme Council has decided to take drastic action at Constantinople to prevent the killing of Christians and enforce peace terms more radical than were contemplated before the trouble at Marmora, have been received with apparent indifference by the Turks, the only effect being the designation of a slightly changed cabinet. The Allied naval displays in the Bosphorus and the British and naval parades in the streets of Constantinople are watched indifferently by the public. The Black, Marmora and Aegean seas are alive with Allied warships ready to co-operate with land forces in the defence of the Straits and enforcement of a blockade should such action be taken.

## PROF. P. A. MURPHY LEAVES FOR IRELAND

Has Accepted a Position in the Royal College of Science, Dublin.

Professor P. A. Murphy, Mrs. Murphy and two children leave tomorrow morning for Ireland, where Professor Murphy has accepted a position with the Agricultural Department in the Royal College of Science, Dublin. The position is a splendid one and while the friends of Mr. and Mrs. Murphy deeply regret their departure all will congratulate them both on the upward move and especially Professor Murphy on his recognition of his abilities from one of the world's most famous seats of learning.

Professor Murphy has been in this province five years and during that time has done more in developing potato culture, not only in Prince Edward Island but through Canada, than any other man in the Dominion. He was appointed some time ago Plan Pathologist for Canada and his advice has been sought and generously given in every province. His departure is a loss to Canada and particularly to this province, but it is unfortunately the old story—the older and larger countries offer inducements that Canada so far, declines to meet.

Professor Murphy was educated in Dublin and after coming to this side of the Atlantic spent a year in Cornell University, accepting a call from the Dominion Department of Agriculture to take charge of the plant pathology department, the duties in connection with which he has filled to the entire satisfaction of the department and of the country. Mrs. Murphy is a native of Ireland and naturally is pleased to return to the land of her birth. They are accompanied home however by two sturdy little Canadians, born in Charlottetown, who will link them to Canada and especially to Prince Edward Island where they have all made many friends who will wish them a safe and pleasant voyage home and the best of luck afterwards.

## REVOLUTION BREAKS OUT IN GERMANY EBERT GOVERNMENT OVERTHROWN

Wolfgang Kapp, President of Monarchist Group, has Assumed the Chancellorship. Plot was Fostered by Monarchists and Pan-Germans and Involved Sections of the Army. Overthrow of Ebert Government Likely to be Fraught with Far-reaching Consequences. Marshal Foch Summons Supreme Council. German Monarchy Proclaimed.

BERLIN, March 14.—The revolution of President Ebert has been overthrown. Dr. Wolfgang Kapp, President of the Faberkind party, has assumed the chancellorship. General Lutwitz is Minister of Defence. The revolution was peaceful. The government's fall followed the announcement yesterday that a revolutionary plot had been discovered. The plot fostered by reactionaries, including monarchists and pan-Germans, involved sections of the army. Herr Gustav Noske Minister of Defence, immediately ordered the arrest of Dr. Kapp and Captain Pabst but was too late.

### Revolutionary Troops Entered Berlin

LONDON, March 14.—Revolutionary troops entered Berlin today, a news agency dispatch asserts. The President declared the government overthrown. Dr. Wolfgang Kapp was named Chancellor.

A Berlin dispatch from Carl D. Groat, United Press staff correspondent, confirmed the news agency dispatch that the government of President Ebert, first head of the new German Republic, has been overthrown. The Berlin dispatch did not mention revolutionary troops however. It said the revolution was "peaceful". Earlier dispatches had said the Reichswehr troops, his hold on the regular army was weak. The dissatisfaction of this element headed by officers who retained, secretly at least, their allegiance to the former Kaiser probably forced Noske to give up his post without fighting. Reports that the revolution was brewing have been current.

Extra editions of afternoon papers were torn from the hands of news boys by anxious citizens, who crowded about newspaper offices.

### Monarchy Proclaimed in Germany

PARIS, March 14.—A Berlin dispatch says that a monarchy has been proclaimed in Germany.

### No Bloodshed.

PARIS, March 14.—The German Peace Delegation received a message direct from Berlin at 8 a. m. declaring there had been no bloodshed up to that time. Delegates said they considered themselves as still representing the government of President Ebert. They awaited official confirmation of the overthrow of the Ebert administration.

### New Government Will Carry Out Treaty.

PARIS, March 14.—Terms of the Treaty of Versailles will be carried out by the new government, according to a Berlin dispatch by way of Basle. The Press Bureau is headed by Capt. Noske and Herr Broedel, lawyer and member of the Nationalist party, the despatch said.

The Moabit police court this afternoon decided there was not any evidence to warrant the placing of the Hohenzollern prince under arrest. The police court found that only mild charges could be brought against him of libel and of attempted duress. The libel consisted of the Princes shouting to the French Captain Klein "get up or get out," when "Deutschland Uber Alles" was played, and the attempted duress consisted of the prince having thrown a spray of flowers at the Frenchmen. There seems to be a concerted attempt to whitewash the Hohenzollern prince, or to get him off easy and the same thing holds good for Count Von Platen.
