**Speculation  
Over Eden's  
Visit To U. S.**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18 (AP)—Newspapers are speculating over the significance of the American visit of Anthony Eden, former British Foreign Secretary, and in much more impressive implications than the role of casual volunteer Ambassador of Anglo-American good will.

There is an inclination, for example, to compare the Eden visit with the inclusion of former Governor Alf Landon in the United States delegation to the Lima Pan-American conference. To some, Eden's hasty coming and going, in a strictly-maintained unofficial status, represents much the same thing as the appointment of Landon who was the last republican presidential nominee.

Both carry to world ears a message of national solidarity to maintain democratic fundamentals against every totalitarian encroachment, regardless of political and policy differences at home in each country. That meaning of Landon's presence at Lima was not intended alone for Latin-American contemplation. It was aimed as much at Rome, Berlin, and Tokyo; and unless most Washington writers misread the real purposes of the Eden visit, it was pointed the same way.

Eden came and went in the wake of his break with the Chamberlain Ministry in England over the policy that led up to Munich; but, as British solidarity and maintain democratic ideals and institutions that furnished his keynote, not internal British friction over ways and means.

There is no creditable hint from any quarter that Eden had a secret mission. On the contrary, the extraordinary public interest he was welcomed in Downing Street. He caught and stirred American imagination as perhaps no other Britisher could have done, and things about him and the circumstances of his resignation from the Chamberlain Cabinet appealed to that idealism strong in the American people.

What the future may hold for this young man of British politics, none can say. The Prime Ministry of Great Britain, someday, is widely forecast for him.

Yet in the wake of his Washington visit, speculation sprang up without benefit of any authoritative background whatever as to whether another role, hardly less important to Anglo-American good will, might not be played. Downing Street might in the near future be seeking a man to interpret British actions to American ears, tell him the truth, and not be overlooked.

There is no suggestion that Sir Ronald Lindsay, the present British Ambassador, is being considered. He has been at his post before the normal British tenure, if there should be a change, it is certain that many Americans would expect to see Eden considered.

**Colbert And Boyer  
At Prince Edward**

After a run of several years in New York, London, Paris and various other world capitals as a stage play, "Tovarich," a comedy dealing with a Grand Duchess and a Prince who were exiled from their native Russia by the revolution, now comes to the screen opening yesterday at the Prince Edward Theatre.

Warner Bros., made the picture and endowed it with a splendid cast and many magnificent settings. Claudette Colbert plays the Grand Duchess and Charles Boyer the Prince. Other notable performers in the cast include Basil Rathbone, Anita Louise, Melville Cooper, Isabel Jeans, Morris Carmovoy, Yip Harbor, Montague Love, Reine Blano and Heather Thatcher.

**MISTAKEN KINDNESS OF PARENTS MAY HURT THE CHILD'S PERSONALITY**

A mistake very easily made by parent is to trace some change in the behavior of their youngster to an illness or operation. Before the illness or operation the youngster was goodnatured, liked school, and was always willing to go messages. But since that time he doesn't like school doesn't like to go messages or do chores. In most cases the illness or operation has nothing to do with the change in the behavior.

All physicians are familiar with these cases. The youngster has an illness, or breaks an arm, or has his tonsils removed, and for some weeks he is treated as a little hero. He does more or less as he pleases, is allowed to remain away from school, takes liberties even to the point of becoming impudent.

After his illness his mother may be looking for after effects of the illness and tells her friends in his hearing that she thinks he has changed. She may be afraid of checking him at all for fear of bringing on a relapse. If a child has been finding it difficult to keep up with his companions at school or play he is very likely to make use of the easy way out offered by the supposition or suggestion that his illness has had bad after effects.

I believe that as parents we should all ponder these plain straightforward words of Dr. Gundry for, after all, it is the youngster's personality and development that is injured by our mistaken kindness after an illness or injury.
