||PATRICK RYAN, son of Patrick Ryan of this town, and Pearle Green, son of Charles Green, who arrived home Thursday evening from South Africa, are the first Summerside boys to return from the war and in fact the only ones from this town who saw any fighting. Pearle Green it will be remembered left here with Johnson's orderly and was attached to the Medical Corps. This contingent was rushed to the front the moment of their arrival in South Africa and saw the closing engagements. Mr. Ryan who has been absent from the island for about ten years was for several years a cowboy in the State of Montana. He first enlisted for South Africa over two years ago at Fort Steele, B. C., during the first part of war and was one of Lord Kitchener's fighting scouts. Under General French he was one of the first to land in Johannesburg when that town was captured. Under Col. Stead he took part in the release of Ladysmith. Besides many other important engagements he took part in the fight at Boshvilt, Durbalib Farm, Haris River, where 25 Canadians were killed and 162 wounded. It was 700 British against 2000 Boers, and Mr. Ryan describes it as the hardest and last real battle of the campaign. Mr. Ryan has made his second trip to South Africa. After returning last fall to British Columbia he again sailed on Jan. 27th last. It was not until his second sailing that he acquainted his parents of the fact, that he had been on the battle field in Africa. He will remain home about two weeks and will then probably go to the Philippine Islands.

THE delegates, R. T. Holman, Richard Hunt and Ronald Campbell, appointed by the Board of Trade to meet Engineer Shewen at Cape Tormentine, crossed in the tug Frank C. Bath, leaving here at 9 15 a. m. yesterday. A number of citizens about 25 in all took advantage of the trip. The sail over the new winter route was delightful. At Cape Tormentine the delegates with Hon. Senator Wood had a satisfactory conference with Mr. Shewen, with whom were Engineer Davy, who has charge of the Northern Counties, and Mr. Raworth, foreman of the extensive repairs now being made to Cape Tormentine pier. Together they examined the site of the proposed protection pier and made themselves generally acquainted with the conditions and requirements of the New Brunswick terminus of the winter route. The interview with Mr. Shewen was most satisfactory and will no doubt bear fruit in the near future. The necessity of protection from floating ice while lying at the wharf with the engineer's plans for a suitable construction will be submitted to the department and no doubt will be acted upon. Dredging on an expensive scale by the large and powerful dredge Cape Breton will begin at once, the dredge being now on her way to the Capes from Digby, N. S. The party had dinner at the Seaside Hotel where they received the hospitality of John Tucker, the genial proprietor. They returned home about 5.30 p.m.
