# A VALUABLE PRIZE CONTEST

The Charlottetown Guardian has secured the right to use the International Newspaper Bible Study Club Lessons each week for the term of one year, commencing with the lesson for August 23rd, 1908. But one paper in each town can use these. The Guardian takes pleasure in being able to present to its readers such a valuable help along the lines of Bible study. They will be published each week in the Morning Daily and the Rural Daily. Only paid-in-advance subscribers to either paper are eligible to join this club. There is no fee for entrance, and no conditions other than those stated below. Everybody stands the same chance and has the same opportunity to get the valuable prizes without the investment of a cent. There is one condition that must in every case be complied with and that is, that every one entering the contest must be a regular subscriber as above.

**GOLD AND SILVER MEDALS, BIBLES, BOOKS.** Persons may join the club at any time during the year, but must, of course, answer the 52 questions hereinafter explained, to qualify for the prizes. It is however, desirable that the questions be answered as the lessons are studied.

The International Newspaper Bible Study Club is for the purpose of promoting, in an unobtrusive way among the masses, a wider study of the Bible, the basic truths of Christianity, and the problems which enter into every man's life. It is composed of all those who join a Local Club, and take up the simple course herein outlined. Although with their sympathetic co-operation, it is not considered fair to have them compete for the prizes. It is however desirable that Bible Class scholars, and church goers generally, may belong to this newspaper club, also non-churchgoers, of all shades of opinion. All such who have not joined are warmly invited to do so and compete for the prizes. The Guardian is authorized to form a Local Newspaper Bible Study Club for its readers, and guarantees to all who join and fulfil the conditions, that everything here promised shall be faithfully carried out.

**CONDITIONS OF THE CONTEST.** 1. Each contestant, or his or her family, must be a paid-in-advance subscriber to The Guardian, during the continuance of the contest, in order to qualify for membership in the International Newspaper Bible Study Club and the Local Club.

2. Each contestant in this Local Club must answer each of the written questions for 52 consecutive weeks, commencing for Sunday, August 23rd and the answers must all be in possession of this paper within two weeks of the close of this period, which allows two weeks grace after the close of the contest.

3. Each question must be answered separately, and the paper written on one side only. No answer must contain more than two hundred words and may be less. It will be a convenience if students will write their answers on letter paper, about 8 1/2 inches by 11 inches.

4. Each answer must have the name and address of the writer at the bottom of the answer, together with the date label of a current issue of The Guardian so it can be identified, giving a number, registered, and then the name will be cut off so the examiner may know it by number only.

5. Students should be careful to understand the question before answering. To do this the lesson text must be read and especially the verses or verses, upon which the question is based.

6. The answers from this Local Club must be delivered to The Guardian office, and they will be collected at the close of the contest and forwarded to headquarters for independent examination by competent examiners. The prizes will then be awarded according to the highest number of marks, won by members of The International Newspaper Bible Study Club, and prizes which may be awarded to members of this local Club will be given out from this office.

**PRIZES.** First Series—A gold medal to each of the first five contestants. Second Series—A silver medal to each of the next five contestants. The Lord Our Shepherd—Psalm 23. Golden Text—The Lord is my Shepherd I shall not want. Ps. xxiii. 1.

Verse 1.—Does God personally shepherd each individual soul? Does scientific research and our knowledge of the vast network of worlds, in the universe, tend to weaken, or strengthen, our faith in God's individual love and care for each person? Does God "shepherd" and love sinners as well as saints? (Read Jesus' story of the lost sheep.) May we learn of the reality of God's individual and constant care of us, by "the practice of the presence of God," the same as we learn to think and see, and do, almost everything else by practice? (This question must be answered in writing by members of the club.)

Is it possible, for a Christian, to depend upon God, the same as one depends upon a government bank note, and do always have the comfort of that dependence in the most trying circumstances?

Verse 2.—As a matter of fact do all who serve God, actually enjoy the bliss suggested by the figures, "He maketh me to lie down in green pastures; he leadeth me beside the still waters?"

Are Christians like sheep, sometimes full and big down "knowing the cud of contentment," and at other times hunting for food, or dying for protection from the enemy?

Verse 3.—The struggle for existence, with men as with sheep, the soul gets tired and weary, and its strength exhausted; what, and where is the source for restoring this soul exhaustion?

What are some of the means which our shepherd takes, to restore our exhausted strength, to increase our faith, and revive our flagging energies?

A hungry sheep is not troubled with "righteousness," but will take food which "belongs to another; contrast this with the way in which God leads the Christian.

Our shepherd leads the soul in "paths of righteousness," now if Christians take, the standard of righteousness, is that, or not, clear evidence that he is a wandering sheep, not under the control of the shepherd?

Verse 4.—The shepherds in Palestine often had to lead their sheep, through valleys and ravines, where death lurked in the shape of wild beasts and other dangers; do Christians to-day, have to pass through similar dangers, and what are some of them?

Is there any part of the journey of life, from the start out in the morning "until we reach the sheep fold at sunset, which is not beset with dangers?"

What is the guarantee that the "shepherd," will destroy all that would destroy the Christian, and take him home to the fold in perfect safety?

When our shepherd finally leads his sheep "through the valley of the shadow of death," which leads to the "better country," what is invariably their experience?
