**Concrete Gravel Produced Locally**



Of interest to the construction-minded public of Prince Edward Island is that washed and screened-to-size concrete gravel is being produced locally. Operations are carried out at Lewes, Queens County and the capacity of the plant is sufficient to fill all Island requirements. This commercial aggregate has been tested by the Federal laboratories at Ottawa and found to conform with high standards.

The material is glacial drift deposit, very hard and of naturally uniform grading. The pit is worked by power shovel and the gravel put through a washing and screening plant by which clay residues are kept at a specified minimum.

The plant is located 27 miles from Charlottetown in the Ingonish district. Shipment is made by both truck and rail. Approximately ten men and numerous trucks are kept employed by the County Construction Company of Charlottetown who own and operate the project.

Pictured above is a shipment going to New Brunswick where the Provincial Oil Co. of Halifax, N.S. is using same on construction work at Port Egan. On P.E.I. this material is being used in place of mainland gravel on construction at the Charlottetown R. R. wharf; new Nurses Home on Brighton Road; Provincial and Kensington town works; Montague Hospital, etc. and etc.

**NEW ZEALAND KEEPS KIWI EGGS AT HOME**

AUCKLAND, N. Z., August 12.—(CP)—The Melbourne Zoo has offered to send the Auckland Zoo a duck-billed platypus in exchange for a kiwi egg, and take the risk whether it hatched or not, but the deal is off. The Auckland Zoo would like a duck-billed platypus, which lays eggs and creates its young, but the Government will not allow it to send the kiwi egg overseas.

The kiwi, New Zealand's strange wingless bird, is becoming increasingly rare. The birds are strictly protected and it is forbidden to send them overseas. The Government fears that if one egg were sent over the country, zoos all over the world would want them and the number of kiwis remaining in New Zealand would be still further reduced.

**Addresses Rotarians On Major Problems**

"Dominion-Provincial relations and the world problem" was the subject of an inspiring address delivered at the Rotary Club luncheon yesterday by Mr. Frank MacKinnon, M. Z. professor of political science and public administration at Carleton College, Ottawa and formerly of Charlottetown.

Following is the text of Mr. MacKinnon's address:

"It is a pleasure and a privilege to me to be here today and I thank you for your cordial welcome. I value this opportunity of experiencing again the kind hospitality you extended to me a year ago.

When I received the invitation from your executive to address you on this occasion I thought of the topic which has been announced to you. It has a three-fold significance at this time. First, during these next few days we on Prince Edward Island are celebrating the biggest birthday of the year. Not only that but this is a time when our Province along with the others, are seeking a new formula at the conference in Paris. These three contemporary events, in each of which we are directly concerned, have suggested the title for my remarks today.

Two major problems faced by Canadians in these times are looming large in our public life. The one, a national problem, concerns the strengthening of the tie that binds our Confederation. The other, an international character, involves the peace of the world. These two problems, while different in scope, are similar in content, for both involve the complex relationships of interest, geographic areas, language, race, religion, culture and economic, political and social ideas. They are not new, the one is as old as Canada itself, while the other has been a dominant theme of human history.

Within our own time we have seen a series of crises in both these fields. In Dominion-Provincial relations there has been a steady attempt since the early 1860's to build Canadian nationhood on a strong foundation. From the discussions of the Fathers of Confederation to the recent meetings of the Premiers numerous Canadian statesmen have directed their endeavours toward this aim. The task has been difficult; much progress has been made; but there is still a long way to go.

With respect to the world problem Canada, along with other nations, has sought to find a place in international affairs. One seeks some formula by which the countries of the world can live together in peace and friendship. Here too the way has been long and hard; some results have been achieved; but here too, there is a great distance to go.

The question arises: Where do we stand in relation to these issues? The answer only too readily comes back from some quarters that we as individuals or as local groups are not immediately concerned—that it is our government that should worry about them—that it is Dominion-Provincial conferences and peace conferences that should do the work. No great mistake can be made, for the day of turning our backs to such matters is gone. Public opinion is now a great force in political affairs and one of the foundations

**A Vital Interest**

"We do not produce in this vital interest in these two questions. We are in the Confederation partnership and have many hopes for it. And we have a part to play, small comparatively, though it be, in the international field. Now is a good time for us to expose our role in both spheres and judge our position accordingly. Dominion-Provincial relations provide an excellent vantage point from which to view the world problem in its true light.

Two trends in Canadian political history are very noticeable. One is the attempt to build a great nation out of the many groups and interests and geographic areas from the Atlantic to the Pacific. The other is the desire to preserve for the constituent parts of the nation their best rights and privileges. In other words our Confederation is a combination of national endeavour and local distinctiveness. The harmony of this relationship has led to Canada's greatness; its difficulties have resulted in the
