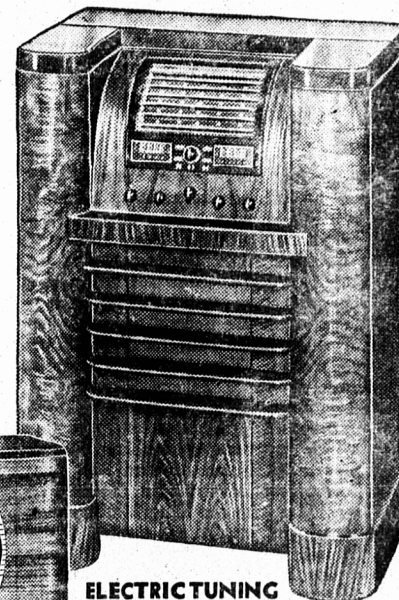
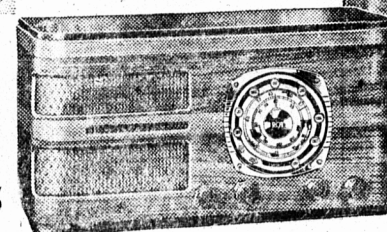

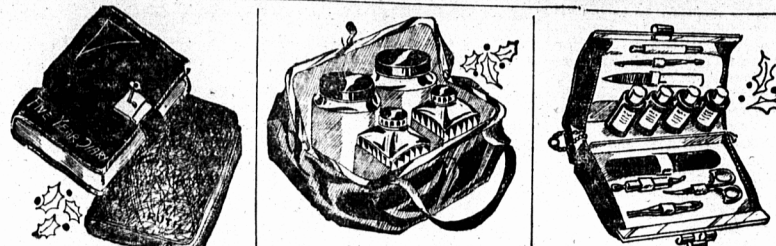

WEXFORD IRISH RECALL REVOLT

GOREY, Ireland, Dec. 20—Plans for elaborate celebrations of the 1798 rebellion of 1798 have been made by the people of Wexford. It was this rising that inspired the rebel song: "Who Fears to Speak of '98" The 150th anniversary of the insurrection at Boolavogue will be commemorated May 28, 1938, by huge bonfires at Oulart Hill, Vinegar Hill and Three Rocks, the scenes of the principal battles. Relics of the famous insurrection will be displayed in Ennisceorthy and pageants will be held. Several memorials will be erected throughout the county on the graves of the insurgent leaders. The 1798 insurrection was organized by the United Irishmen movement as a desperate move against the English. Though the rebels were nearly all Roman Catholics, many of the leaders were Protestants. Irish historians say that the insurrection was "planned in an evil hour." It was promptly crushed by the English and most of the ringleaders paid the extreme penalty. Popular legend attributed its failure to "drink" and one ballad has preserved the famous slogan for use in Irish temperance campaigns: "Twas Drink that Brought us Down."

SUMMONS ULSTER TO MEET THREAT

BELFAST, Dec. 20 — Under no conditions whatsoever would Ulster submit to any sovereign power other than that of the King, said Lord Craigavon, prime minister of Northern Ireland, appealing to the "Loyalists of Ulster" for a united front.
