Morenz Star Of Canadiens In Scoreless Overtime Tilt

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York, Dec. 7.—(A.P.)—The New York Rangers and Montreal Canadiens battled through 70 minutes of a hard and often fast National Hockey League game tonight without a goal for either side. The result left their places in the standing unchanged, the Canadiens second in the Canadian Division and the Rangers last in the American.

The game produced plenty of speedy skating but taken as a whole it was not good hockey. Neither team showed a consistent attack and the timing of passes was off on both sides. It was more a battle of individual teams with the work of Andy Aitkenhead standing out.

The Ranger goalie stopped 46 shots as he chucked up his third consecutive shutout and in the second period he gave an especially brilliant performance as he turned back one attack after another when the Habitués displayed their best attack. Doug Brennan and Earl Seibert on the defense and Bill Cook in an all around job also did good work for the Rangers.

For the Canadiens Howie Morenz was the star, speeding the entire rink with his speedy dashes that took him into the midst of every play, offensive or defensive. Pit Laine's wide sweep checks broke up a good many Ranger raids while the newcomers, Sammy Godin and Jack Riley occasionally made trouble for the New York defence.

Although there were numerous opportunities to score through shots that hit goal posts and might just as well have gone in but more openings were lost when rival defence men arrived just in time to spoil scoring shots.

ST. JOHN MAY HAVE PRO GAME

Movement On Foot To Have Loyalist City Team in Can.-Amer. League Next Season.

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Dec. 7.—A movement was started here today to give Saint John a taste of professional hockey this season as a preliminary step in efforts to have a team from this city compete in the Canadian-American Hockey League during the 1934-35 season.

After conferring here today with officials of the Forum, Joseph Page, sports director of the Canadian Pacific Railway at Montreal, talked over long distance telephone with Judge James Dooley, of Providence, R. I., President of the Canadian-American League.

President Dooley said he favored the proposal, but added it would have to be considered by his directorate. He suggested sending two teams of the pro league here for matches once or twice this season, in order to give Saint John fans a chance to see the brand of hockey played in this league.

Forum officials said there was a strong likelihood that Saint John could have its own professional team in the Canadian-American league next year. This need not interfere in any way with amateur league games, they said.

Reports Are Again Denied By Ahearn

OTTAWA, Dec. 7.—Another flat denial was issued here tonight by Frank Ahearn, owner of the Ottawa Senators, that his team would merge with New York Americans, changing the National Hockey League to an eight team loop.

"The reports," said Ahearn, "are absolutely wrong.

QUEBEC, Dec. 7.—(C.P.)—Three vessels which today stranded in Lake St. Peter had been released tonight and reached Three Rivers where they anchored during the hour of darkness.

The vessels concerned are the Nidarholm, a Norwegian steamer enroute from Montreal to London; the Osebostrand, a Swedish motorship from Montreal to Botwood, Nfld.; and the Trajan, Norwegian steamer, enroute from the Great Lakes overseas.
