

THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)

OTTAWA, Dec. 14—(Eggs)—Some reductions in prices have been reported today from different centres, otherwise prices and conditions are generally unchanged.

TORONTO—This egg market is steady today. Dealers are quoting country shippers extra 54-55 cents; firsts 46-47c; seconds 32c; pullet extra 42c. The poultry market is also steady.

CALGARY—Prices of storage eggs are lower today on this market. Dealers are now selling at extra 37c; firsts 35c; seconds 30c. A carload of storage firsts rolled to Montreal on consignment this week.

ST. JOHN—The tendency to shade prices continues on this market as receipts of fresh eggs are increasing. Prices to retailers are lower at extra 68-72c; firsts 60-64c; seconds 38c; pullet extra 55c. Poultry market is active with demand for geese good. These are selling at 24-26 cents; turkey prices are low at 32-35c.

HALIFAX—With receipts of fresh eggs increasing on this market, dealers have made further reductions in paying prices and dealers are now paying country shippers delivered extra 62-64; firsts 52 and 54 cents; seconds 40 cts.

VANCOUVER—Prices on this egg market are lower today. Dealers are quoting producers for extra 38 cents; firsts 34 cents; pullet extra 32 cents.

MONTREAL—The domestic and export trade in all lines of grain here today was decidedly quiet but prices were unchanged. A moderate amount of business was done in spring and winter wheat flour and prices were firm. The inquiry for all lines of millfeed was good and Standard grades of rolled oats were in good demand. The undertone to the butter market continued strong and prices were marked up another fraction. This was attributed to the good demand and the small supplies available. Receipts were 218 packages. Extreme dullness again marked the cheese trade but prices remained about steady. Receipts were 197 boxes. The feature of the egg trade was weakness that developed in market for fresh grades and values were reduced two to three cents per dozen. Storage eggs were unchanged. Receipts were 327 cases. Potato prices were reduced two cents per bag owing to the inactive demand. P. E. I. whites sold at 7c and green mountains at 83c per 90 lb. bags. Canadian beans

War Veteran Has Returned

LOWELL, Mass., Dec. 14.—After thirty years of almost continuous service in the United States Army Master Sergeant Donald R. Williamson has returned to his native home here, pensioned for the remainder of his life. As long as he lives, and Williamson is still in his forties, he will receive \$144.57 a month from the government.

Williamson's first enlistment was on June 22, 1898, when he was 18 years old. He saw several months service in Porto Rico during the Spanish American War and was mustered out about a year later. The Army fever was in his blood, however, and he soon signed up again, to participate in the Philippine Insurrection. He was mustered out in Manila in 1901, but immediately re-enlisted. When his enlistment again expired he promptly re-enlisted, and so it has gone ever since, finding him with the nation's colors during the World War and after. Williamson is still a bachelor.
